Plenary Council Joint Statement Our parish has joined with 34 other parishes to put out an agreed Statement based on key issues identified from parish submissions to the Plenary Council. Last Saturday, 60 people met at Catholic Theological College. 5 parishes organized the meeting: Parkville, Templestowe, Kilmore, Cheltenham and Grovedale & Torquay. Peter Sheehan from our parish analised and presented the key themes from 15 parish and 7 individual submissions to the Plenary Council. The meeting, over 2 hours, discussed the value of putting out a common Statement, what was missing from the key issues identified, and individually rated the key issues. The meeting agreed that putting out a joint statement was worthwhile, as the submission process of the Plenary Council does not allow for a collective input from a diocese. A drafting group has been formed. The next steps are to complete the analysis of the key issues identified from the meeting and the parish submissions and to prepare a draft Statement by 30 April. This will then be sent to each participating parish to discuss and seek endorsement through a parish meeting between 1 and 13 May. The Statement will then be finalised and sent by 15 May to the Plenary Council Secretariat and the Archdiocese of Melbourne.

SYMBOLS FOR THE EASTER VIGIL

Wood for the Fire The celebration of the Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday night begins with an Easter fire outside the Church. This wood will be used in the fire. Fire is a symbol of the powerful presence of God – the light burning in the midst of our darkness.

The Easter Candle The flame for our Easter Candle will be lit from the fire. The flame of the candle will remind us that Christ, the light of the world, has risen from the dead and has shattered our darkness. Our own small candles will be lit from this great candle. At our Baptism we were presented with a candle and were invited to keep the light of Christ burning brightly.

Jug of water The water in the jug will be blessed at the Eater Vigil as our water of baptism. The whole community will be sprinkled with this water as a sign of our own Baptism. It symbolises the water of the Red Sea through which God's people escaped from slavery to freedom.

In addition to all of the above, let us not forget the Word of God, Bread, Wine, simple table and people.
