Living the Gospel – My Son, the Beloved

'You are my Son, the Beloved; my favour rests on you.'

This declaration by the voice from Heaven – the voice of God – is an amalgamation of two earlier pieces of scripture: 'You are my son; today I have begotten you' (Ps 2:7) and 'Here is my servant, whom I uphold, my chosen, in whom my soul delights' (Is 42:1).

The fact that it is uttered before Jesus has begun his ministry is a sign to all of us that God delights in us for who we are, not for what we have achieved in our lives.



The Baptism of the Lord:

I am back just in time for the end of the Christmas Season: the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord.

The story takes a jump: birth and the shepherds, then a gap of perhaps a year till the Wise Men arrive (think of the age of children Herod wanted killed ...) and now Jesus is thirty and getting baptised.

Great gaps in Jesus' life – unexplained beyond "And Jesus increased in wisdom and in years and in divine and human favour."

People try to imagine what filled the gaps, what did Jesus do as he grew up?

We seem these days to want to know the details, to be able to give a full account of each second of each day.

We want to tie down all the details.

But ... that is not what God wants.


We don't get any of that type of clarity from the Bible, Hebrew Scriptures or New Testament.

What we do get is clarity of what God wants to reveal to us: today, with Jesus' baptism we get the last piece of the proof of God's one-ness with us: Jesus is human (born of Mary and ultimately of Adam); Jesus arises from the history of the people (he is Hebrew and is of the line of David); Jesus grows in wisdom and years: with God / with Mary and Joseph.

Now he shows that he shares in the consequences of our sinfulness.

God doesn't distance himself from our stupidity of action but comes close and (without sinning) enters into the consequences of our sin so he can be with us and show us how to open our hearts to God's love through his Son Jesus.

Once again we are called to let Jesus be with us, to guide us, to carry us when needed.

This may seem a burden but it is a significant way of showing in a clear and public way that we care about our children enough to develop a habit individually and as a community: a habit of thinking through the implications of what we do in the light of needing to care for our children in today's Fr Charles world. Baptism is a feast of belonging to a community.

Real community is real messy.
But if you stick with it you will discover that it is truly a <u>magnificent mess</u>.

Questions to Ponder:

- Each year we celebrate the feast of the Baptism of the Lord, an important moment in Jesus' life and a transition to his public ministry. How do you celebrate the anniversary of your own baptism?
- The first reading from the prophet Isaiah seems to contain an oxymoron the Lord's chosen one will "bring forth justice to nations" while "not crying out, not shouting, / not making his voice heard in the street". Who models this quiet, nonviolent justice for you?
- In the Acts of the Apostles, Peter ends his summary of Jesus' ministry by stating, "He went about doing good / and healing all those oppressed by the devil, / for God was with him." How does your family and parish community continue to carry out the ministry of Jesus?
- After Jesus is baptised, a voice from the heavens proclaims, "This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased." From this place of "belovedness" Jesus begins his public ministry. How would it change your ministry if you were to hear the voice of God proclaim to you each day, "You are my beloved in whom I am well pleased"?
