# From the PP's Desk... Pentecost!

Thank you for journeying through the Lenten and Easter Seasons with me. Today, Pentecost Sunday, we remember and are caught up in the presence of the Holy Spirit leading us, guiding us, calling us, inspiring us.

With the Ascension we are given charge of the mission to go and make disciples, to spread the good news of God's love for us. With Pentecost we are given the inspiration to be capable of going out to the world and being heard. What a privilege! Now ... what happens?

You are already giving of your time, talent and treasure—I may not see all of you giving but I know it is true. How might we grow in this journey? Five questions might be useful as we seek to live our mission as a faithful Christian community. Am I / are we:

- 1. A worshipping community? Truly Active, engaged, present?
- 2. Growing in faith; as followers of Jesus Christ?
- 3. Growing our lives so that we are serving the will of the Father?
- 4. Spending time to build our relationships as a community? Are we reaching out and actively connecting with others?
- 5. Giving in a spirit of gratitude for God and the graces given to us freely? Giving generously so that we can reach out to those who have not yet responded to the Good News?

If we can say "Yes Yes Yes Yes Yes" then we have every chance of overcoming the effects of the pandemic, overcoming disinterest, drawing people to come and know Jesus Christ's love.

I listened to a recent episode of "God Forbid". The comment was made that we, people of faith, are irrelevant to most young people—yet a comment was also made that young people are intensely interested in the meaning of life. This truth is borne out by my recent experience during a Q&A with some of our grade 3/4 children. Their questions to me ranged from "Who made God?" to "How did God raise Jesus from the dead?" to " How can Jesus bebot god and man?" to "how did Jesus come to be?"

If children today have such urgent, penetrating questions, surely adults must too. We are not irrelevant if we step up and fill this thirst to know of God and God's love. It's not simple. It's not easy. It is essential. **Be sealed with the Holy Spirit, Alleluia Alleluia!!! Fr Charles**

### Vale Sir Gerard Brennan

Australia's 10th chief justice, Sir Gerard Brennan, has been remembered as a "man of deep humanity" after passing away at the age of 94. Sir Gerard joined the High Court in 1981 and was chief justice from 1995 to 1998. He played a significant role in landmark judgments on native title – notably Mabo – the implied freedom of political free speech and criminal law. Sir Gerard's lead judgment on the Mabo case recognised for the first time under Australian law that Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples had lived in Australia for thousands of years and their rights to their land according to their own laws and customs not only predated, but survived, settlement and continue to this day. Sir Gerard was also the patriarch of one of Australia's great legal families. His son Frank is a priest and noted human rights lawyer. Father Frank Brennan said on Thursday that his father "died peacefully at 11pm [on Wednesday night]" in Sydney.

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles	A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Romans
They were all filled with the Holy Spirit, and began to speak different languages. When Pentecost day came round, the apostle had all met in one room, when suddenly they heard what sounded like a powerful wind fro heaven, the noise of which filled the entire house in which they were sitting; and something appeared to them that seemed lik tongues of fire; these separated and came to rest on the head of each of them. They were filled with the Holy Spirit, and began to speak foreign languages as the Spirit gave them the gift of speech. Now there were devout men living in Jerusalem from every nation under heaver and at this sound they all assembled, each or bewildered to hear these men speaking his own language. They were amazed and astonished. 'Surely' they said 'all these men speaking are Galileans? How does it happen that each of us hears them in his own native language? Parthians, Medes and Elamites; people from Mesopotamia, Judaea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya round Cyrene; as well as visitor from Rome – Jews and proselytes alike – Cretans and Arabs; we hear them preaching in our own language about the marvels of God.'	<ul> <li>People who are interested only in unspiritual things can never be pleasing to God. Your interests, however, are not in the unspiritual, but in the spiritual, since the Spirit of God has made his home in you. In fact, unless you possessed the Spirit of Christ you would not belong to him.</li> <li>Though your body may be dead it is because of sin, but if Christ is in you then your spirit is life itself because you have been justified; and if the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead is living in you, then he who raised Jesus from the dead will give life to your own mortal bodies through his Spirit living in you.</li> <li>So then, my brothers, there is no necessity for us to obey our unspiritual selves or to live unspiritual lives. If you do live in that way, you are doomed to die; but if by the Spirit you put an end to the misdeeds of the body you will live. Everyone moved by the Spirit is a son of God. The spirit you received is not the spirit of slaves bringing fear into your lives again; it is the spirit of sons, and it makes us cry out, 'Abba, Father!' The Spirit himself and our spirit bear united witness that we are children of God. And if we are children we are heirs as well: heirs of God and coheirs with Christ, sharing his sufferings so</li> </ul>
