Thoughts from the mind of the PP...

Call for members: we need more people to step in and help us function fully and effectively: liturgy group, **computer** operators, sacristans, lectors, ministers assisting at holy communion, ministers visiting the sick/homebound, welcoming group, youth group, children's liturgy, Altar Servers, Men's Group, RCIA group leadership, flowers, church environment, church cleaning, Sacramental Program Catechists, Parish Pastoral Council etc. etc. Please look into your heart: what are you called to do to help us be the presence/light of Christ for others?

Yes, I know! Some of those groups don't exist at present – but ... there is a gleam in the parish eye that is seeking to grow and the new groups or re-newed groups are a part of seeking to be vibrant and vital.

Yes it takes a commitment but if you're reading this you are 90% of the way there because you already believe in Jesus Christ and you already want to make a difference.

Dreaming:

I use that word in the sense of imagining and praying for the future but also with a little, maybe a lot, of the sense it has for Aboriginal peoples – a sense of the ever growing, on going present, past and potential future that encompasses the whole of our lives. In our case it is our lives as followers of Jesus the Christ.

If you remember Gerry Lewis, who held the Lay Ecclesial Leader role before Tiziana: he wrote up his thoughts about the parish and throughout the report was a thread of 'we want to grow' 'we want to be vibrant' 'we want more children/young people active' ... perhaps 'need' was strongly there.

If you would do me a favour: perhaps you could do write down and send to the office two things:

First: describe/write down how do you encounter Jesus Christ or the Holy Spirit (or both) in your life – one or two instances.

Second: we are in a community of two parishes with St Greg's – what dream would you have about how we might grow that community over the coming five to ten years? I'm not talking about merging parishes but a community that grows in richness and vibrancy. What would you like to see? And if possible – how might you help that come to fruition?

This is slightly different to what Gerry was asking about in his interviews: he concentrated on St Kevin's alone – I'm interested in how we grow at St Kevin's as part of the added dimensions of community that we are now a part of with St Greg's.

REFLECTIONS ON THE READINGS OF THE FIRST SUNDAY OF LENT				
First Reading	Second Reading			
<u>Genesis 2: 7-9, 3: 1-7</u>	Romans 5: 12-19			
The very first reading of the Sundays of Lent presents us with age-old and ever-present questions. How did the world come to be? What is humankind's relationship with God? What is man's relationship with woman? How do we make moral choices? What is it to be self-conscious? The book of Genesis offers no conclusive answer to these sorts of questions. Instead it tells stories for us to inhabit and explore. Today's reading yokes together two parts of one of these stories. Unlike the majestic account we hear at the Paschal Vigil, this older story of creation begins with man being fashioned from the dust of the earth. The garden of paradise is created, then in verses we don't hear, animals and finally woman. We rejoin the story with the episode of the fall. It's somewhat like a folk tale. It introduces but does not explain the figure of the serpent. This crafty creature slides along the boundaries of the animal, the human and the divine, and especially between truth and falsehood. The story weaves together animated dialogue, dramatic action, and a consequential outcome but offers no conclusive answers to our questions. What was the tree of the knowledge of good and evil? Why was eating its fruit forbidden? Where did the serpent come from? Why did eating from the tree expose their nakedness?	After the first reading's engaging narrative of the fall, we now grapple with a sustained and complex theological argument from Paul. The essence of his thought is simple enough. It's the contrast between Adam (a name meaning "man") and Christ. Adam sinned, as did everyone after him, bringing death and condemnation to all. Christ obeyed, bringing grace, acquittal, life and righteousness to all. It's an "a fortiori" case: how much greater and more beneficial for everyone are the consequences of Christ's action in comparison with Adam's. A new humanity and a new creation have come into being. While this can be stated plainly enough, Paul's busy mind keeps generating fresh ideas or new ways of making his point. It makes him prone to digression and repetition. This fertility of thought has produced a text that is overloaded. By omitting some of the asides that flow from Paul's opening sentence, the shorter version of the reading is easier to follow, though it still contains some long and elaborate sentences.
