Words and wonderings from the PP...

Recently I clicked on a discussion with Bishop Robert Baron about whether Vatican II has been a success or a failure. He did a very "Jesus" thing: he took a third path. Essentially he said that the question presents a false division, a false separation as though things are completely black and white.

Rather than success/fail he started with a presumption that the Holy Spirit was working in that gathering of Church bishops who voted by an absolute majority in favour of the documents produced. If we believe that the Holy Spirit works with its church, with us, then the question is not success/fail but why have we not more fully accepted the teachings of Vatican II? This question reminds us that we are always called to do more: if we are breathing then God still has a purpose that we can fulfil if we are willing to keep following Jesus the Christ. And it reminds us that whatever we are doing, if it is something God wants us to be doing it must be done from growing our unity in Jesus Christ.

We live in a world that seems to want to decide everything on some absolute yes/no, black/white, right/wrong, me or you basis. Bishop Baron's comment on Vatican II calls us to look inside ourselves and seek a different way, a way which finds a path through which everyone can grow and enter more deeply into God's love.

During that same video Bishop Baron quoted a result from some research done in the USA by the Pew Research Centre (a Christian research organisation). That result: 69% of Catholics don't believe in the real presence of Jesus Christ in the Eucharistic bread and wine after consecration.

That statistic shocked me because when I see you coming to receive Holy Communion I don't see sceptics, I see believers; I don't see indifference, I see love. So I looked into the research a little and took the survey myself.

I can't look into the hearts of other people answering the survey to know their true beliefs but the survey seemed to me to be asking "can you fully explain what happens during the consecration of the bread and wine to become the body and blood of Jesus Christ?" At which point I would have to fall on the side of saying 'NO.' Not because I don't believe in the real presence: I do believe and I know that consciously deep within every time I raise by hands before you holding what was bread and wine and say "behold the Lamb of God" - truly I am seeing and presenting the fullness of Jesus the Christ.

My answer to the survey would be 'no' because it is impossible to completely explain God and God's work with us. I went back and read a learned article on 'transubstantiation' and it concluded that there is a valuable millennia long effort to deepen our understanding of what it means to say Jesus is truly present in Holy Communion but all that effort starts from the certain and deep belief that Jesus Christ, the Second person of the Trinity, truly meant what he said when he said "this is my body", "this is my blood."

As we seek to understand the world around us, and understand our faith, and understand what the Holy Spirit is calling us to grow into as a parish let us always remember that we start from faith. Which means there is always more to learn, there are always new ways to grow, there are always new ways to find through which we can share our faith, share God's love.

Fitzroy Crossing Floods Appeal

Today's second collection will go towards the Fitzroy Crossing Floods Appeal, which bore the brunt of what has been described as the worst flood in the state's history. The flood has created an inland sea spanning 50 kilometres, forcing hundreds of residents to flee, leaving roads impassable and isolating remote Aboriginal communities. With parts of Fitzroy Crossing completely inundated with water, authorities estimate as many as 100 homes have been damaged and more than 280 people across the Kimberley region have been relocated or evacuated.



REFLECTIONS ON THE READINGS OF THE THIRD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

First Reading

Second Reading 1 Corinthians 1: 10-13, 17

Paul sarcastically suggests) Christ himself.

Isaiah 8: 23-9: 3

The historical origins of this oracle of the prophet Isaiah are unclear, but here it is linked to the expansion of the Assyrian empire around the year 730 BC when Israel's northern provinces, Zebulun and Naphtali, were overrun. This disaster, the prophet announces, has been reversed. Light has dispelled the darkness and deep shadow of foreign dominion. The yoke, rod and bar of the oppressor have been broken. Gladness and joy abound as when there is a harvest or booty to share.

There's no mistaking the jubilant spirit of this text, even if it may not have as much dramatic impact as when it's proclaimed (with additional verses) at the Midnight Mass of Christmas. It's cited to good effect in today's gospel. Assuming that the assembly is unfamiliar with the historical references in the opening verse, readers will need to proclaim it with a strong sense of its importance.

It serves as a kind of drum roll to get everyone's attention before the wonderful good news is heralded: "The people that walked in darkness has seen a great light".

No sooner has Paul completed his greeting and prayer of thanksgiving than he starts addressing the problems that have prompted his letter. He wastes no time chiding the Corinthians for the divisions and disagreements that have split the community. They have formed factions aligned with their favoured teacher, whether Paul, Apollos or Peter, or even (as

This leads Paul to restate and reaffirm the nature of his apostolic calling. First and foremost, his mission is to proclaim the gospel. His role is to plough and sow the field with the word, as it were, paving the way for others to administer baptism. And the gospel he preaches is not a worldly wisdom but the mystery of the cross. He will have much more to say on this subject later in the letter.

The mood of this passage changes. It begins with a plea for unity but becomes challenging, even confrontational. We can feel Paul's exasperation coming to the surface. He throws their slogans back at them and fires off a series of questions before finally reminding them of his mission.
