You will recall Fr Charles wrote a progress report in March on parish planning and future thinking.

Following the report, Fr Charles and the four parishioners supporting him (Alfred Ablaza, Margaret O'Donnell, Tiziana D'Costa and Carmel Purdey) held small group consultations with parishioners from St Gregory's and St Kevin's. The consultations are designed to give parishioners the opportunity to provide feedback and ask questions following the Progress Report. The staff from both parish offices have also been consulted.

The consultations have given the parishioners from both parishes a chance to get to know one another and to exchange views. Each time, the dialogue was open, constructive and frank.

These are the themes that have emerged from the consultations:

- Widespread support for consultation, dialogue and cooperation between the parishes. ٠
- Keep communication open and up to date on parish planning.
- Widespread acceptance that Fr Charles is the parish priest of two parishes and two communities. We need to work together to alleviate the obvious pressures of one parish priest looking after two parishes. Sharing resources where appropriate, for example, administration could be a way forward to address this.

- Acknowledgement that each parish has its own history, traditions and culture.
- Support for sharing of resources (eg safeguarding committee) and learning from each other. ٠

#### Patiently waiting in hope for unity

Notwithstanding **60,000** years background in this land It has only been since **1967** that Indigenous people have been included in in the Australian census, and give the right to vote! In **2015** Indigenous Leaders met with Prime Minister Malcolm Turnbull and Opposition Leader Bill Shorten at Kirribilli House and issue the Kirribilli Statement. In response, the Prime Minister and Opposition Leader established the *Referendum Council*. In **2017** The Referendum Council held a National First Nations Constitutional Convention at Uluru to ratify the decision making of the Regional Dialogues. The Convention delegates drafted and overwhelmingly endorsed the *Uluru Statement from the Heart*, which is graciously *offered to the Australian people*. It calls for a constitutionally entrenched First Nations Voice to Parliament, and a Makarrata commission to oversee a process of treaty-making and truth-telling. The Referendum Council handed down its final report, which endorses

the Uluru Statement from the Heart and its call for Voice, Treaty and Truth. It has been shared with all our parishioners. The Uluru Statement has been endorsed by Australian Bishops and the Plenary Council. On 20 March **2023** the Attorney General Government presented the Referendum Bill to Parliament. #### Oceania bishops publish response to Synod of Bishops document

#### **Continental Discernments Around the World**

The Continental Stage of the synodal process came to an official end on Friday, 31 March 2023. This stage not only included the celebration of seven continental assemblies but also further listening and discernment by the people of God. The fruits of these discussions have led to each continental assembly writing a Final Document which will contribute to the work of the first session of the Synod of Bishops on 4-29 October 2023.

The seven continental documents will form the basis for the Instrumentum Laboris, which is the working document for the first session of the XVI Ordinary General Assembly of the Synod of Bishops. This will be produced by the Preparatory Commission, set up by the General Secretariat of the Synod. Archbishop Timothy Costelloe SDB is one of the members of the Commission, with the other members announced here: Press Release of the General Secretariat of the Synod

#### A Pondering From Fr Charles during his absence:

Thirty years ago my family and I were visiting the Minnamurra Falls near Kiama, New South Wales. There was a sign by the path and it said: "A small stone taken is nothing. A pretty flower taken is nothing. But there are two million visitors to these falls each year. If each person takes a stone – there would be nowhere to put the paths along this river. If each person took a flower – the three varieties unique to these falls would become extinct."

Small things: consequences!

That's a rather negative view. But let's take a positive view.

If each visitor donated \$1 to the management trust for Minnamurra Falls, that national park could do wonders to

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles	A reading from the first letter of St Peter			
It was impossible for him to be held by the power of Hades.	The ransom that was paid to free you was the blood of the Lamb, Jesus Christ.			
Given the length of the reading, it may seem that we are hearing Peter's entire Pentecost day speech. In fact it's only the middle (albeit the longest) section. The first part, in which he draws on the prophet Joel to explain the phenomena of the event (eg the cosmic	After the lavish hymn of praise that constituted last week's reading, today's is quite different in tone. It's an admonition. Readers of this letter are warned to be mindful of their situation.			
signs and the prophetic speech), is never heard. The third part serves as next Sunday's reading.	They are not to forget the price that has been paid to secure their freedom.			
The body of the speech focusses on the person of Jesus. Luke establishes a pattern that will be repeated in later speeches. He has Peter interpret Jesus in the light of the traditions that his Jewish audience would have been familiar with, in this case Psalm 15/16 and the patriarch-prophet David.	Their ransom from a "useless way of life" was not paid in worldly treasure but in the "precious blood" of the perfect lamb that was Christ. Since they are not yet dwelling in their heavenly homeland, they must be "scrupulously careful" about how they live.			
The reading itself falls into three parts. In the first, Peter argues that Jesus' rejection, death and resurrection were all foreseen by God and brought to fulfilment by God's power. Evil human agency has been overtaken by the saving will of God. The second is an excerpt from Psalm 15/16 expressing trust and confidence in God's life-giving love. The psalmist is sure of being saved from the shadowy realm of Sheol and of living on in God's presence. In itself it is not an expression of belief in life beyond death, but that is how Peter now applies it to Jesus.	<ul> <li>While this passage does contrast in spirit with last Sunday's, it has one thing in common.</li> <li>It too is a single lengthy sentence in the original Greek.</li> <li>Even when broken down to three or four sentences in English, it is still an elaborate text.</li> <li>So much for Peter's complaint in his second letter about Paul's letters being "hard to understand"!</li> <li>Having highlighted the incomparable value of Christ's sacrificial death and its present revelation, the reading ends with a clear affirmation of the recipients' "faith and hope in God".</li> </ul>			
This third part is the most difficult for contemporary				

Christians. Peter argues that the psalm, attributed to David, was a prophecy of life after death. However, since David was dead and his burial place known, he must have been prophesying about Jesus, not himself. Having made this point, Peter returns to the event of the day, the outpouring of the Spirit. What this means is dealt with in next Sunday's passage. This is a taxing reading for both lector and listeners. It is long and complex, though its key messages are simple: "You killed him, but God raised him to life" and "what you see and hear is the outpouring of that Spirit".
