#### A Word From our Lay Ecclesial Leader...

Mother's Day is a day of mixed emotions for me. I love spending time with my children and extended family; but it is also a day tinged with sadness because I lost my mother many years ago. Despite my mixed feelings, the celebration of 'mothering' is a good thing. I just wish we thought about it more often than just once a year.

Mothering is at the heart of what it means to be Church; it is about caring, protecting, supporting and understanding others. This is not limited to women, men can 'mother' too. Pope Francis uses Mother imagery for the Church. He has spoken of the Church of tenderness, the dwelling place of the living God. The pontiff says, in today's fragmented world - where it is easy to lose our bearings, a Mother's embrace is essential.

According to Sr Joan Chittister, we ought to view God as the 'mother'. This is not new theology. Take as an example the Book of Wisdom where God's creative energy is referred to as Lady Wisdom. Viewing God as Mother could mean living in a world that nurtures its weakest - as a birthing mother does, a world that preserves the planet, a world that is compassionate. When we rely on traditionally masculine images of God as the lawgiver, judge and omnipotent being, we strip away some of the motherly qualities that are so intrinsic to the Divine. The result is we live in a world with a shrivelled heart.

Wishing all the mothers and mother figures in our parish a wonderful Mother's Day.

#### The Budget, the Disadvantaged and the Future

The May 2023 budget has been generally applauded for focusing particular attention on 'the disadvantaged', although now including many *newly disadvantaged* people struggling to survive dramatic increases in cost of living, costs of education, health, food, transport, housing and rental accommodation. Add to that the already noticeable risk of food and resource shortages, pandemics, not to mention the substantial consequences of climate change. These challenges don't exclude our 'lucky country', as bushfires and floods further remind us. Very local examples in hills of the Dandenongs and low-lying *Maribyrnong* bring this closer to home. Many such challenges arise from unprecedented circumstances that are both local and global. Warfare, human displacement, injustice, uncertainty, fear and resulting mental illhealth affect more, including very young people as new records now alarmingly reveal. It's also generally believed that budgets to come won't be able to remain as generous. However despite the gloom there's much to be encouraged by. Goodness abounds, good things are happening with many people collectively helping make them happen, often with necessary new ways of doing things. Our young people are a key to this. Let's listen deeply to them, and to each other. Our Faith gives us a clear Mission, and mandate, as Easter reminds us. Synodality can drive us further. Locally that of course includes all of us in St Kevin's and St Gregory's Parishes doing our bit to help, not just locally, but equally also in the world around us - doesn't it!

#### A Pondering From Fr Charles during his absence:

By the time you read these words I am back in Australia – spending some time in Perth (WA) – with by brother and with friends, some of whom I have known since 1977 when Tanya and I moved there and then decided to have children.

My mother came to visit – we had lived in Perth from 1956-1960 when we emigrated to Australia – and she didn't recognise the place. So very much had changed. As I get ready for my trip to begin in just 48 hours I find myself wondering what Perth will be like now since I haven't been there for fifteen years. A lot changes.

When we lived in Perth Tanya and I experienced an earthquake and the tail end of a cyclone. An engineer pointed out that the skyscrapers were built to US West-Coast standards but the earthquakes in Perth are totally different – the movements are different – the earth shakes differently. We can think ourselves all prepared but ... things change, new things arise.

How will Perth have changed this time? I don't know. I shall find out I suppose.

How will I have changed after these weeks away? How will you have changed?


I know you've been in the capable hands of the priests who will provide supply for every weekend.

I had lunch with Fr Len Thomas and Fr Bill Gill on the Friday before I left on holiday. I know them both from before my ordination and after my ordination. Len remembers that he provided supply in St Kevin's when Gerry went on sabbatical for three months and apparently I diffidently asked him, as the newly ordained Permanent Deacon "do you mind if I preach at some of the Masses" – my memory is that he readily allowed me to.
