From the Desk of our Lay Ecclesial Leader...

It is a happy coincidence that this weekend we have Confirmations on Pentecost Sunday. Confirmation seals and completes Baptism. Through the outpouring of the Holy Spirit, candidates are filled with the grace to follow the example of Christ and serve others.

In John's account of Pentecost, the first gift of Jesus' Spirit is 'Peace'. Twice, Jesus says to the disciples 'Peace be with you'. How is this message relevant to the young people receiving Confirmation, and indeed to any young people in our life?

What does inner peace look like in a frantic world?

I like what Richard Leonard SJ says about this. Christ's gift of peace in the Gospel is more robust than peace you may experience briefly sitting cross legged in a darkened room. Inner peace comes from practice born of making consistently good choices. It is a way of life and a state of mind. It is about having realistic expectations that we (and others) have weaknesses, and that each day things may go wrong. God's peace, then, is to cultivate an attitude of acceptance for the ebbs and flows of life. To nurture a warm heart filled with forgiveness for us and others. It is not always easy to do; we must practice it. But it is worth the effort.

May the promise of inner peace sustain our young people in these complex and uncertain times.

Secrets of St Kevin's - and Pentecost


People attend Mass, appreciate hospitality, then leave spiritually and socially enriched as intended. But underneath and beyond are very many more essential keys to our purpose, things done 'invisibly' by just a few. People come together to knit and sew needed clothes, run clubs. Others Plan the Parish future, a synodal church, manage donations, advocate for justice. Some support refugees with friendship, kindness, goods or money. Others provide pastoral and ecclesial support, sweep floors, manage gardens and clean buildings and toilets. On Saturday mornings someone comes to check/replace flowers, vacuum floors. Some manage and present Multimedia for Masses. Others provide live music, sing, write, read, produce and present liturgies for each Mass. Some visit others, manage events, finances, administration, or create Newsletters. At various times of day or night the Parish Priest visits and ministers to the sick and dying at critical times. He visits schools. Funerals are arranged. Prompting all this and more from Pentecost reflects new Beginnings, which are part of Church Renewal - by all.


National Reconciliation Week Events in Rome



The Australian Embassy to the Holy See is announcing a series of special events from 29 May to 3 June 2023, focused on reconciliation with Indigenous Australians. The events will coincide with the visit by Dr Miriam Rose Ungunmerr Baumann AM, a renowned Australian Aboriginal elder, educator and artist who is expected to meet with Pope Francis in what will be her first trip from Australia's 'outback' to Rome.

REFLECTIONS ON THE READINGS OF PENTECOST SUNDAY

First Reading Second Reading

Acts 2: 1-11

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

They were all filled with the Holy Spirit, and began to speak different languages.

When God called Moses and the Israelites into covenant at Mt Sinai, awe-inspiring phenomena accompanied the event. Thunder, lightning, cloud, smoke, fire and a thunderous trumpet all testified to God's might and majesty. The descent of the Spirit on the apostles in Jerusalem is also marked by impressive signs – tongues of fire, a powerful and noisy wind, and a language epiphany.

The apostles were being "clothed with the power from on high" and "baptised with the Holy Spirit" just as Jesus had promised. Obedient to his command, they had stayed in the city and prayed in the upper room "together with several women, including Mary, the mother of Jesus, and with his brothers".

They were not alone in Jerusalem. Jewish pilgrims from all parts of the diaspora had come to the city to celebrate the autumn harvest festival of Pentecost and commemorate the Sinai covenant and the giving of the Mosaic Law. This feast and much else in the Jewish tradition, such as creation, Babel and the oracles of the prophets, forms the backdrop to this new event.

1 Cor 12: 3-7, 12-13

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Corinthians

In the one Spirit we were all baptised, making one body.

Paul's letters are often prompted by problems that have arisen in his communities. The happy outcome of this is the teaching that he expounds in response. Today's reading is a case in point, though it gives no clue as to the particular issue Paul is addressing – the disruptive and divisive role of the gift of tongues. This only becomes clear later in the letter.

One of the revolutionary features of the Christian movement was the way it transcended conventional social distinctions and barriers. Baptism and the gifts of the Spirit were given freely to all, regardless of race and status (and gender). Paul reminds the Corinthians that whatever gift they enjoy is not a personal possession or achievement but the work of the Spirit.

The countercultural social unity of the Christian community was put in jeopardy by the Corinthians prizing one gift above another and losing sight of their common purpose, to build up the body of Christ. Paul's use of the body metaphor to demonstrate diversity and unity is not unique; it was common in the ancient world. He simply adopts and Christianises it.

Today's text makes no reference to the problematic issues Paul is dealing with. It is wholly affirmative.
