My family celebrated the beginning of 2023 with a party. We shared a great night with dear, close friends. They are a wonderful group of people from different walks of life. We have travelled together along life's journey through thick and thin.

A close friendship requires vulnerability. It is only when I am open to share my hopes and fears that I can create a deeper channel of communication with the other. It takes courage to be vulnerable because I am opening myself up to potential judgement and exposing who I really am. And it is a little harder for me to do because I am by inclination a private person. However, the rewards of deep human connection are immense.

I was thinking of this when I read Sunday's gospel. Jesus says What I say to you in the dark, tell in the daylight; what you hear in whispers, proclaim from the house-tops.

Bringing our hopes and fears out from the shadows, with an appropriate person at an appropriate time, can work wonders for our wellbeing and for building and cementing relationships.

It also applies to sharing our faith. To be open about our beliefs, our questions and doubts can be difficult to do; both when the listener is a person of faith, and when they are not. Will we upset others by sharing? Do we have the right words? Will we be judged? These are all valid questions, but Jesus' words spur us to be brave; to share with others what He whispers in our heart.

Let's reach out to someone we know and take a chance to open up about our faith.

Bill Passed Confirming 'Voice' Referendum – our vote soon to be called!

Last Monday a bill to alter the constitution and enable the Indigenous voice was passed without amendment by the federal parliament, 52 votes to 19, ahead of what will now be Australia's first referendum in 24 years. This confirmed the simple wording of the constitutional change to be put to the Australian people "to alter the Constitution to recognise the First Peoples of Australia by establishing an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Voice". A key underlying issue is not new and has long existed without resolution since colonisation! It's an issue of justice, equality and equal opportunity, about which very much has already been written. Associated with that and looking ahead it's also the important issue in today's challenging world of building a nation by unifying our people and benefiting from what all can contribute. We will all be called soon to choose. If not now, then overtaken by other overwhelming global issues when? Apart from all else already written in detail it's further worth recalling what Popes John Paul II and Francis have said, and what Fr Frank Brennan (among others) has drawn from that, as can be read on our Parish Social Justice Action website page. Without being an operational body, the members can commit to discuss and discern and also help make things happen.

We need a few extra members for the Parish Pastoral Council and within that we desperately need someone from each parish who will take on the role of Chair – helping run meetings and helping draw together the priorities needed and the agenda. I consider the Parish Pastoral Council important, now and in the future. Can you help? I don't know you all, and certainly with most of you not well enough to know your gifts. Please! Pray! Discern! Take a risk! Catch me, come and see me! Jesus the Christ needs your hands!
