A word from the Lay Ecclesial Leader...

In my circle of extended family and friends there are some who identify as *spiritual but not religious*. This is a refrain that has become popular in recent times. Generally, people who subscribe to this view reject religion because they consider it rigid, doctrinal and dogmatic. On the other hand, they prefer spirituality because it promises an experience of the divine - it relies on feelings and the heart.

This weekend is the feast of the Body and Blood of Christ. There are two important aspects to the Eucharist. Firstly, Jesus is present in the Eucharist. Christ gives of Himself. He pours himself out to us so that we may be transformed to be more like him. Secondly, we receive the Eucharist as a community. We encounter and receive the outpouring of divine love together. We experience it as a community of faith.

Our personal relationship with the divine is very important, but we cannot be spiritual beings in isolation. We fully express ourselves in interaction with others.

Community is deeply valued in our society. People often uproot themselves and make a tree or sea change for a place where 'there is a great sense of community'. Many are devoted to the community of their football team. Families with young children cherish their school community.

And so, it occurs to me that the Eucharist is steeped in values which remain important in our times and culture: spirituality and community. We need to find a contemporary language to make the meaning of the Eucharist come alive in our society.

Your Contributions Serve Intended Purpose and are Appreciated

Many people are challenged by rising costs and uncertain futures, yet the people of St Kevin's Parish continue to support those facing greater challenges. On Good Friday our Parish collected for the Annual Holy Places appeal for Christian people living difficult lives in Israel, Palestine, Egypt, Syria, Jordan. Lebanon, Rhodes and Cyprus, and for Holy Places there. We raised \$1,777.50 which, added to collections from other Parishes, really helps. Following that our Parish contribution to Project compassion this year came to \$4,459.75 (including a \$302.50 donation from St Kevin's school). When we recall the short weekly videos shown at Mass during Project Compassion we gain a fuller sense of the lives of people this donation has positively helped improve. Easter is over and we now return to Ordinary Time. We are all *called to Mission*, and now is a good time. There are people in our own parish and local community who can be helped in various practical ways, so if you can, chat to any Social Justice Action committee member including Carmel Purdey, Tony Robinson, Lawrence Cecconello and John Costa.

This Tuesday, 13th June is the Feast Day of St Anthony of Padua.

St Anthony of Padua's life is what every Christian's life is meant to be; a steady courage to face the ups and downs of life, the call to love and forgive, to be concerned for the needs of others, to deal with crisis great and small, and to have our feet solidly on the ground of total trusting love and dependence on God.






Have you noticed people missing from our Masses?
