#### From the Desk of our Lay Ecclesial Leader...

One of the many things I value about our Catholic tradition is that we do not read the Gospel literally.

The Second Vatican Council affirmed that, when we read Scripture, we ought to take into account its historical, literary, textual and cultural context. Reading the Bible this way goes beyond who did and said what in a literal sense. Our tradition considers the context in which the words were written to discern the truth of God's love and derive meaning in our day and age. Read this way, Scripture endures as a universal text for all times.

In the long version of this Sunday's gospel Jesus does not intend for his parables to be taken literally. We get a glimpse of one (of what must have been many) teaching moments where Jesus interprets a parable to the disciples. A literal reading does not get the meaning through.

I hear a common refrain from those who are disengaged from faith: 'how is Scripture relevant to our time?' I can see their point of view if the entire truth of the Scripture were only to be found in the words themselves. But, as Catholics, we have a great interpretative scholarly tradition to draw from. Let's use it! We can share with others the richness of the sacred text as it reveals the truth of God's love in a meaningful to a modern audience.

Two weeks ago I mentioned the members from Australia at the Synod on a Synodal Church. I misunderstood / misread the range of Australian based participants at the Synod on a Synodal Church: there are actually five bishops and five others as members in various roles and four expert facilitators. Which is marvellous indeed! As part of my comments I spoke of people 'saving the Plenary Council' - on reflection and after some discussions with others that was an overstatement—the Council did not need saving—it did need a re-think about how it was structured—and many people contributed to that re-think which led to success. You may not have noticed but I did notice: I commented in one of my homilies that the descendants of Joseph, the son of Jacob sold into slavery in Egypt, gave a line of descent to David and then Jesus. Wrong! A mis-statement in the moment. Other than being tribes of Israel and all descended from Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, the lines of Joseph do not lead to the line of Judah and Benjamin that lead to King David and ultimately to Jesus.

I don't think this matter would be earthshaking in its consequence if I just let it lie unaddressed—but admitting it and correcting it is important to me—and the truth is important to me, and honesty is important to me, and accepting responsibility is important to me. It is a part of being a good person and a good disciple of Christ. Jesus Christ calls us to these characteristics in a good healthy loving community and even in small things I find it important to seek to live up to the ideal.

#### REFLECTIONS ON THE READINGS OF THE SIXTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

First Reading

Wisdom 12: 13. 16-19 A reading from the book of Wisdom

*In the place of sin, you give repentance.* 

It isn't at all obvious that this passage from the book of Wisdom (or the Wisdom of Solomon) comes from what might be called its "historical" section (the third and final part). The text itself gives no clue that in these chapters the author is musing on God's providence in the course of Israel's history, especially the exodus. There are no references to time or place, so what we have is a rather abstract text.

The author's aim is to praise God for tempering the exercise of power and justice with mercy, mildness and forgiveness. This may have been Israel's experience, but it was not that of the people of Canaan whose punishment by God is described in the preceding verses (nowhere to be found in the lectionary). We are spared having to wrestle with this apparent contradiction. We are left with a lesson in how we human beings should treat one another. Just as God shows us kindness and forbearance, so should we to one another.

#### Romans 8: 26-27

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Romans The Spirit himself pleads for us in a way that could never be put into words.

**Second Reading** 

What Paul has to say about prayer in today's short text from Romans may seem remote from Jesus' teaching in the gospel. When asked by the disciples to teach them to pray, Jesus offered them what we now call the Lord's Prayer and told them to pray "like this". Paul writes as if it is a common experience for the baptised to be unable to "choose words in order to pray properly" or to "know how to pray as we ought".

In this case the Spirit prays within us "with sighs too deep for words" or "with inexpressible groanings" that are perfectly understood by God. In this way we are drawn into the intimate relationship between Spirit and God. Interestingly, Paul does not make clear whether we ourselves hear and understand what the Spirit is uttering within us.

Short though the reading is, almost all of it is in one extended sentence. In this case, Paul's thought unfolds clearly enough.

### A friendly reminder about parish health and safety
