## From the Keyboard of Fr Charles...

Hello and welcome again to St Keivn's!

Why am I welcoming you to your parish? Because as the leader, the parish priest, I want to say I love that you respond to God's call, to Jesus Christ calling you. I love that you come together seeking to be the community that is the presence of Jesus Christ. And I welcome you to his table. It is so easy to become accustomed to each other, to cease truly seeing each other. So welcome and thank you for your faith.

## Church layout:

You will notice that the chairs are much more tightly drawn in around the altar this week. We had a Liturgy Group meeting during the week and one item was 'how can we best improve the liturgical space, the visibility and placement of the alter particularly so that we can celebrate at the table more effectively?" As we talked we realised the chairs had moved themselves into classroom lines instead of semi-circles – so we rearranged them around the altar. That isn't the end though. Somehow we need the altar table to be raised sufficiently to be visible without dominating. Have you seen a church where you think this being visible / being among the people is done superbly well? Please share your experience and your thoughts.

## The Voice:

I was part of a conversation during the week about the balance or difference between praying in a way which suggests success of the referendum on a voice to parliament for our First Peoples and telling people how to vote in that referendum. The discussion was robust but respectful. And that summed up something important: the conversation / discussion leading up to the vote in this important referendum needs to be respectful and we need to listen, listen deeply, daddiri<sup>1</sup> deep listening. Listen to the call of the Holy Spirit for justice and compassion and right relationship. And listen to the concerns about how to respond to that call. I have said already, I shall vote yes, and that remains true. It is my belief that this is what the Holy Spirit is calling us to as a first step along the way of truly becoming one nation that welcomes our First Peoples fully for who they are and gives them the respect as people created in the image of God – people who can grow past the evils of the past 250 years and become whole again. But you ... you will see the world differently ... and that is as God intends. I try hard to keep the Holy Spirit as my inspiration – it is something we all need to do.

#### Catholic Bishops' Social Justice Statement for 2023-2024 released - what do you think of it?

This weekend we celebrate Social Justice Sunday. The Catholic Bishops Social Justice Statement for 2023-2024, Listen, Learn, Love: a *New Engagement with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples* is being distributed to church communities, and among other things will give more background to the Referendum on the Voice. A copy is available on our Parish website SJA Page together with a 6 minute video of its Foreword, but here is a guick summary: At the heart of the Social Justice Statement is a section by the National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Catholic Community, NATSICC, explaining why the Uluru Statement is asking for a Voice to parliament as a further positive step to help overcome acute disadvantage and promote progressive engagement with our First Peoples. The bishops well know there are differences of view about the referendum and that Australians are free in good conscience to vote as they see fit. At the same time the bishops are highlighting the urgent moral issues involved, so as to allow our Indigenous people the same rights and opportunities other Australians enjoy, as we also collectively look ahead to a more unified and productive future for Australia.

The Priests Retirement Foundation was established in 1990 and contributes to the ongoing care of retired priests across the Archdiocese of Melbourne. This includes, but is not limited to, the provision of suitable accommodation and health care and medical out of pocket expenses.

#### Caring for those who cared

Within the Archdiocese, there are two purpose-built retirement homes: Justin Villa in North Balwyn and George Maher House in Clifton Hill. Priests may also choose to live privately in their own house (often inherited) or a house or unit where the rental is funded by the Foundation. The physical and mental wellbeing of all retired priests is continually overseen by two highly qualified nurses also funded by the Foundation.

REFLECTIONS ON THE READINGS OF THE TWENTY FIRST SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME					
First Reading	Second Reading				
Isaiah 22: 19-23	Romans 11: 33-36				
A reading from the prophet Isaiah	A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Romans				
I place the key of the House of David upon his shoulder.	From him, through him, and in him are all things.				
This enigmatic oracle from the prophet Isaiah appears to relate to the reign of King Hezekiah in Judah some seven hundred years before the birth of Christ. While Hezekiah a significant reformer and an active player in the geo- political games of the day, this oracle relates to internal palace affairs. It seems that the master of the palace, Shebna, had failed his duties. He is therefore summarily dismissed. The viole language describing his fate – he's to be "wound up into a ball" and "hurled into an immense country" where he will – has been omitted from the lectionary. The bulk of the passage is devoted to the investiture of his replacement, Eliakim, who later proved to be a disappointment. Eliakim's installation is described in grandly poetic terms impressive garb, extensive authority and the promise of glory. The justification for the choice of this obscure text comes into view when we hear reference made to the key the kingdom and Eliakim's power to open and close. We we be reminded of this when we get to today's gospel readir Except for those who are biblically literate, this reading w not be readily understood.	After wrestling for three chapters with the vexed issue of Jewish rejection of Jesus, it's no wonder that Paul bursts into praise. He had come to a conclusion of sorts, as we heard last Sunday. As he saw it, the Gentiles' faith in Jesus was intended to make Jews jealous of what they were missing. They remained within the wide arc of God's mercy and would be saved in God's good time. Nonetheless the whole situation remained humanly inexplicable. All that Paul can do is praise God for the mystery of it all. God's wisdom and knowledge are beyond human comprehension, as the prophet Isaiah had long since acknowledged and Job confessed.
