17th October St Ignatius of Antioch At Antioch, where he was bishop, his death has been commemorated on this day since the fourth century. Remembered for being devoted to Christ and his resurrection, he urged Christians to unity in and through the Eucharist.

18th October St Luke

Remembered as being the author of the Third Gospel and the Acts of the Apostles. Almost certainly a Gentile and perhaps a companion of St Paul, he wrote to reassure those who had grown uncertain toward the end of the first century.

On 28 October, the Australian Catholic University (ACU) Melbourne campus will host the 2023 Benedict Conference the first of its kind here in Melbourne. This inaugural event will bring together international and local speakers to explore the life and legacy of Pope Benedict XVI (otherwise known as Joseph Ratzinger), building its conversations around the themes of truth, goodness and beauty.

One way or another, this weekend will be a significant weekend for Australia, and Social Justice!

With no certainty over the outcome of the VOICE Referendum I ask myself whether after this weekend the long-standing Australian spirit of a fair go will still prevail?

Debate has often focused on things like holding the Government to ransom, high cost, lack of information, and social division. The main focus through all of this this should be the intent of the Voice, that is to gently remove the vast gap separating the lives of 1st Nations people, and everyone else. Australia's most authoritative legal authority has dismissed any argument about holding the Government to ransom, yet this argument has persisted.

As for information, anyone with a real interest in this Referendum has 200 years of documented miserable indigenous history, together with 60,000 years of prior occupancy to learn from. According to the Productivity Commission the Australian Government spent \$33 billion unproductively on indigenous issues over 2015-16 because it was not based on understanding Indigenous issues and solutions. As for having 'full information' about the major decisions Governments need to make in relation to future economics, warfare, climate change, social and technological change, pandemics and much else, there can never be 'full information'. However national 'principles' and values need always to underpin decisions that support equality, unity, shared prosperity and a 'fair go' for all. *- John Costa, SJA*

REFLECTIONS ON THE READINGS OF THE TWENTY EIGHTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME				
First Reading	Second Reading			
Isaiah 25: 6-10	Philippians 4: 12-14. 19-20			
A reading from the prophet Isaiah <i>The Lord will prepare a feast and will wipe away the tears</i> <i>from every cheek.</i> In Isaiah's oracle about the messianic banquet, several boundaries disappear as we listen. The boundary separating Israel from the nations dissolves; this banquet is for "all peoples". Earthly time and heavenly time merge, for this event will occur in God's good time. Grief gives way to joy, limits are swept away by abundance, and alienation from God is replaced with communion. It's a vision of	A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Philippians <i>I am able to do all things in him who strengthens me.</i> Apart from the final words of personal greeting that round off Paul's letter to the Philippians, today's passage brings it to a close. In verses omitted from the lectionary text, Paul acknowledges receipt of several gifts of money the community had sent to support him. Earlier in the letter he had identified "brother Epaphroditus" as			
fulfilment beyond human imagining. This passage may be familiar to some because it's a recommended text for funerals, but that use may lead to a common misinterpretation. The "mourning veil" and "shroud" are not garments that clothe either mourners or the dead. They refer to the veil in the Temple that kept the Holy of Holies from view, because for earthly mortals to see God's glory was to die. That barrier is destined to be removed to let human beings commune with the divine. This is a visionary text that draws on powerful images. One is that of a banquet. The enjoyment of abundant fare and table-friendship is a fundamental human good that serves well to symbolise our ultimate destiny. Another is that of the holy mountain. Mountain peaks appear regularly in the	the community's courier. That's the background to Paul's words: "it was good of you to share with me in my hardships". Paul's regular practice was to insist on being financially independent, refusing, for example, to accept support from the Corinthians or the Ephesians. He seems to have made an exception of the Philippians because of his friendship with them. But even while expressing his thanks to them, Paul seems reluctant to admit his needs. He writes of his capacity for self-sufficiency – a Stoic virtue, but here explicitly rooted in God's sure bounty. All this seems to moderate Paul's gratitude for the			
scriptures as privileged places for human beings to encounter God. Isaiah combines these images to paint a picture of profound appeal. The oracle has a poetic quality to it, as is evidenced by the way it is set out in the lectionary.	Philippians' support. Nonetheless, this is an attractive reading. It offers wise counsel about contentment in our current age of aspiration and entitlement. Above all it invites grateful acknowledgement of God's generous goodness.
