A word from the Lay Ecclesial Leader...

During Lent, we fast, pray and give. It is a time when we slow down and make room for God. This is important: it is easy to let life take over and to neglect our relationship with God.

Our Lenten program kicked off on Thursday. We had a wonderful discussion and reflection on the readings and themes of the first Sunday of Lent. We are using the 'Living in Harmony' booklet; it contains pearls of wisdom from well-known writers such as Joan Chittister and Andy Hamilton.

In the introduction to the booklet, Fr Hamilton says: 'Harmony is a discipline. It has to be won, held, remade, revalued. At its best, it is built around the joyful play of difference, a mutual love and respect, and a treasuring of other voices and ways. It builds for trust and consensus.'

This has struck a chord with me because our world needs peace and harmony more than ever. I'm perhaps more aware of it having spent some time in Europe recently where news of war (in the Ukraine and the Middle East) are never far away from people's minds and are ever present in the media. But also, we need harmony in our Australian society, which has become polarised. It seems we have lost the art of civilised public debate, of respecting one another's views. Exchanges often result in toxic and vitriolic personal attacks.

Harmony in the home, in the workplace and in society is hard won. It doesn't just happen. It takes goodwill and commitment - just like anything else that is worthwhile.

How do we bring about harmony? We may need to 'fast' (read: give up on) ready-made judgements and self-righteousness; we need to 'give' of ourselves by embracing diversity and seeing God in the other; and we need to 'pray' for the wisdom and courage to do so.

I am aware this is not the way we usually fast, pray and give during Lent. Maybe it is harder to give up prejudice than chocolate, or it is harder to give someone who holds different views the benefit of the doubt than giving alms to the poor. Nonetheless, God calls us to renew our relationship in the context of our lives; and to bring about the change that is needed in 2024.





Words from our PP...

What a wonderful start to Lent, for me at least. Having so many parishioners attend and participate in our Masses for Ash Wednesday: amazing! Our faith is alive, and strong: Praise the Lord!!!

Lenten Regulations remain the same: Fasting and Abstinence from meat on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. Abstinence for all over the age of 14; fasting from age 18-60. Encouraged for others but not binding. And special attention to Prayer, Self-Denial, Helping Others on all Fridays of Lent. More details are on the notice board.

Over the Sundays of Lent we will hear from St Mark telling us of the Temptations of Jesus and of Jesus' Transfiguration. Then we journey with St John telling us of the destruction of the Temple (his death), the nature of Service in faith, the need to die like a grain of wheat. Then back to St Mark's account of the Passion and Death of Jesus, leading us into Holy Week.

The journey of Lent is a journey we make each year. It is a journey with Jesus, a journey that leads us to learn yet again that Jesus is human with us and also the Son of God, divine but close to us. Yes a man but not just a man: God. Yes an inspiring leader but much more than that, the only leader who died for us so that we can be united within the love that is Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

Lent: comes from northern hemisphere roots in a word for lengthening, lengthening of the day as Winter passes and Spring begins and Summer beckons. This year, perhaps, the journey of Lent can be that for us: a lengthening of the light of Christ that shines in us and through us so that we are ready for the joy that is the three days of Good Friday, Holy Saturday, Easter Sunday and then the fifty days that lead to Pentecost.

PS: The pilot of the Alpha experience for our parish is progressing well. The twenty or so people participating are all regular Catholics and everyone is finding the commitment of time worthwhile. You'd think that being Catholics all our lives, most of us, we'd know it all.

But no! This intentional journey from ignorance into knowing Jesus as the Christ is engaging and inspirational. We are all learning. As the year progresses, we will begin running Alpha regularly and you will be invited to share this privilege of spending some time renewing the beginnings of faith.

REFLECTIONS ON THE READINGS OF THE FIRST SUNDAY OF LENT

First Reading

Genesis 9: 8-15

A reading from the book of Genesis

I will recall the covenant between myself and you... the waters shall never again become a flood to destroy all flesh.

The story of Noah unfolds through four chapters of the book of Genesis, with the flood occupying centre stage in the telling of the tale. Scholars observe that, not only have two accounts been woven together to create the biblical version, but quite similar flood stories were common enough in the literature of the ancient near east.

Today's reading presents the happy outcome of the flood. The world has been purged of its wickedness and God establishes a new relationship with the whole of creation. Just as the waters were tamed at the birth of creation, so now, God says, they will never destroy the earth again. Every living thing originally created by God is encompassed by the covenant announced to Noah. The rainbow which could be seen as a divine weapon firing bolts of lightning is now a sign of universal and everlasting peace.

The form of the reading is a solemn pronouncement by God. As it conveys good news from start to finish, it lends itself to being proclaimed with positive energy, but at the same time with dignity and authority.

1 Peter 3: 18-22

A reading from the first letter of St Peter

The water of the flood is a type of the baptism which saves you now.

Second Reading

In his second letter, Peter complains that Paul's letters can be hard to understand. It has to be said that today's passage from Peter's first letter is equally difficult. Even if we can draw a clear message out of it – that by his death, resurrection and return to God Christ has gained authority over all powers, that salvation is offered to all, and that baptism is our way of sharing in that salvation much remains obscure.

While there is a direct connection with the story of Noah and the flood, no-one is sure what is meant by "the spirits in prison" or by Christ's going to preach to them. There may or may not be a connection with Christ's descent into hell that we confess in the Apostles Creed. Even Peter's description of baptism as "a pledge made to God from a good conscience" is puzzling.

This means that readers face a double challenge. Not only are the contents of the reading opaque, but the way they are expressed – in sentences that become longer and more convoluted as the text progresses – is a further hurdle. In that respect Peter is on a par with Paul!
