Praying!

I have spoken about various forms of prayer over the past couple of months about prayer and the dimensions of prayer and the various ways Christ Jesus and the Holy Spirit are present for us.

After a decade of ordained life, I have prayed over many people. Prayed when celebrating or administering Sacraments. Prayed over people when they come needing support and guidance in some need, often for an urgent need.

But ... I have never to my memory been prayed over other than when receiving a sacrament.

This past Thursday I had that experience: being prayed over by two members of our parish life. Obviously this way of prayer is not something new that has never been experienced by anyone ever before. No, it is an old experience, Charismatic groups do it all the time, and we know that Jesus prayed over people so this way of prayer is at least that old. But for me to be intentionally prayed over by others, not priests: that was special, new, and it evoked a few thoughts.

I got the gift of the Holy Spirit I had asked for – the prayer was answered in my heart, new confidence arose. It took courage for me to name to others an area of my life for which I wanted prayer, an area of vulnerability. It took trust to allow two people to come close enough to put their hands on my shoulders and speak and even greater trust that the words they would speak would be the <u>right</u> words. It took openness and patience in myself to wait for the touch of the Holy Spirit arising from the prayers spoken over me by people who in turn were trusting that the Holy Spirit would give them the words I needed to hear. Awesome! God's grace is multifaceted and efficacious! Praise the Lord.

"I have now graduated senior school and I am so proud of myself," she said. "I feel hopeful for the future... Now it's not impossible for me to achieve my dream... Thank you."



Feast Days this week:...

27th February St Gabriel Possenti *Struck with tuberculosis at the age of* 24, Gabriel died on February 27, 1862, before his ordination to the priesthood. His fidelity to prayer, *joyfulness of spirit and habitual* mortifications stand out in his otherwise ordinary life. Pope Benedict XV canonized Gabriel in 1920 and declared him a patron of Catholic youth. His patronage is also invoked by the Church for students, seminarians, novices and clerics. Thousands of divine favours are attributed to his intercession with Christ Crucified and the Sorrowful Mother Mary.




The next **St Kevin's Men's Social Group** takes place on **Friday**, 8th **March @ 7.30pm in the Church Gathering Space**.

REFLECTIONS ON THE READINGS OF THE SECOND SUNDAY OF LENT				
First Reading	Second Reading			
<u>Genesis 22: 1-2. 9-13. 15-18</u>	<u>Romans 8: 31-34</u>			
A reading from the book of Genesis	A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Romans			
The sacrifice of Abraham, our father in faith.	God did not spare his own Son.			
This story is often called "The Sacrifice of Isaac," but such a title is misleading. Isaac is spared, not sacrificed. In Jewish and Islamic tradition it's called "The Binding of Isaac," referring to Abraham's tying up of Isaac before placing him on the altar. It might well be named "The Sacrifice of Abraham" since the patriarch is being asked to surrender both his son and his hope of descendants. But "The Testing of Abraham" best captures the essence of the story. It's one of the most emotionally powerful and dramatic stories of the entire Bible. The growing pathos in God's naming of Isaac as Abraham's "sonyour only childIsaac whom you love" sets the scene for the almost unbearable increase in tension towards the climax of the episode. This is swiftly reached in the abbreviated lectionary text, allowing the longer half of the reading to be enjoyed in peace.	Before he moves into a lengthy and anguished reflection on the failure of his fellow Jews to find faith in Jesus, Paul brings the first half of Romans to an eloquent close. He assumes the role of a barrister addressing the court in full flight, arguing the case for the surpassing goodness and faithfulness of God. He poses a series of rhetorical questions, each of which implies a resounding "No!" He's intent on persuading his distant readers that God is on their side. The gift of his Son testifies to God's boundless generosity and mercy. Unlike Isaac who is saved from being sacrificed by Abraham, Jesus is not rescued from death but raised out of death. Above and beyond his saving self-sacrifice, Jesus remains a permanent advocate for us at God's right hand. This short and exuberant text deserves to be delivered with enthusiasm. It's an energetic endorsement of God's love for us in Christ.
