# A word from the Lay Ecclesial Leader

At the end of summer, it is time for the grape harvest. In Italian, this is called 'la vendemmia'.

I have fond childhood memories of glorious, sun-soaked days at my great-uncle's vineyard in Sicily. The whole extended family gathered for *la vendemmia*, the grape harvest: three generations of children, parents, grandparents, uncles, aunties, cousins and friends.

If you were old enough, you were given a sharp knife or a pair of secateurs and be put to work. You learnt pretty quickly how to cut the grapes off the vine, remove any dead leaves (they make the wine bitter!) and watch out for pesky wasps attracted to the juicy, ripe fruit.

The women folk spoiled us with a huge spread for lunch; the men lifted the heavy crates and did lots of running around. I clearly remember my Dad driving the tractor surrounded by a gang of smiling children happily joyriding. The weather was invariably hot; we would mark the end of the harvest with a dip in the dam.

The wine that was produced was special because we made it together, with joy and goodwill. Every time it was poured in each household, we remembered the golden harvest day and the special family bond.

This week's Gospel reminds me of those beautiful harvest days. We fulfil God's vision of the vineyard when we work together in our parish to bring God's love, compassion and kindness to the community. We do it together, because it is a labour of love. And it takes different forms, such as our ministry to the local aged care homes, youth group or social justice. God's vision of the vineyard bids us to do more than come to church once a week. God wants to put our faith into action together.

# Much to be learned from Courage, Endurance, 'Mateship' and Sacrifice pillars

Yes, last Sunday's poignant ANZAC Commemoration Parish Mass, Thursday's ANZAC day Mass, other ANZAC remembrances particularly including the PM's two-day Kokoda trek prompt much contemplation about profound human values under shared adversity. The word 'Mateship' including in its ANZAC context actually and equally comprises non-gender meaning in the sacrifices of women, those from different backgrounds, races, cultures and ages and, lest we forget, including 1st nation peoples who also sacrificed their lives and health in war. Beyond ANZAC the broad term 'Mateship' equally applies to each one of us every day, meaning working with and dependent on one other, for mutual support and survival in an increasingly challenging world and changing times. The pillars of Courage, Endurance. 'Mateship' and Sacrifice apply to us all in navigating life journeys. Our shared faith and mission in our Parish and private lives say as much. This prompts a reminder that a recording of Lawrence Cecconello's personal Camino journey one-hour presentation last week is now available on the Parish website SJA and Home Pages. # REFLECTIONS ON THE READINGS FOR THE FIFTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

# First Reading

# Acts of the Apostles 9: 26-31

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

He explained how the Lord appeared to Saul and spoke to him on his journey.

The dramatic episode that precedes today's reading – Saul's experience of enlightenment on the road to Damascus – had momentous consequences not just for the fledgling Church but for the entire history of Christianity. Strangely enough, neither it, nor Paul's subsequent re-telling of the story, is to be found in the Sunday lectionary. There's further mystery too, in that elsewhere Paul offers an account of his visit to Jerusalem that is markedly different from that of Luke.

Taking today's text on its merits, we find Saul (not called Paul until 13:9) in a kind of no-person's-land, in that he was at odds both with his ancestral community and his suspicious new companions. But once Barnabas, true to his name ("son of encouragement,"), has introduced him, Saul preaches so boldly that he provokes a hostile reaction necessitating his being sent away for safety's sake.

Luke rounds out the story with another one of his upbeat summaries about the growth of the Church. This fulfils what Jesus had said to the apostles before his ascension, but with the additional mention of Galilee.

The reading is an action-packed narrative that pulsates with the driving force of the Spirit.

# 1 John 3: 18-24

A reading from the first letter of St John

His commandments are these: that we believe and that we love one another.

**Second Reading** 

The letter of James and those of John are radically different in style, but the two authors agree on one thing. Faith is testified to by works of love. "I will prove to you that I have faith by showing you my good deeds," wrote James. Only "real and active" love can give the assurance "that we are children of the truth," writes John.

John links faith and love together later in today's passage. God's commandments are to "believe in the name of his Son Jesus Christ" and to "love one another." Believing and loving go hand in hand. While simply put, believing in the name of Jesus is broad in scope. It encompasses the true identity of Jesus as Son of God and Word made flesh, and it acknowledges his active power and presence within the community of believers.

There are differences of opinion as to what John means by conscience and its accusations, but apart from this the reading is clearly expressed. It invites thoughtful delivery that allows the community to mull on the life it is called to, one of faith, love, trust and peace.
