#### From the desk of Fr Charles...

#### Alpha:

Thank you to those who have signed up for Alpha. Please continue to give your names, but we will now have to put you on a waiting list as we are full up. We can only manage 16 or so people until we have more leaders coming through the system. There will be another Alpha later in the year.

#### Safeguarding:

There was a regional Safeguarding Gathering this past Tuesday, held at St Kevin's with much of the St Greg's and St Kevin's Safeguarding Committees attending (thank you very much). The gathering was held to introduce a new "Self-Assessment" tool and it looks much easier to work through than the old one.

Thank you Ana and Margaret, Gianna and Marcello, Vera and Michelle, Viviana and now also (Fr) Isaac — I thank them but also I thank you, the people who have to live these policies so we develop a culture where we are aware of safety generally and especially safety for our children.

One discussion was around the length of the new Code of Conduct (14 pages) - why does a code need to be that long? Can I just sign the last page and leave the rest unread? Well ... you can I suppose, I guess I wouldn't know if you did that but ... Brech and Tara, our Safeguarding advisers at the gathering, said "Would you sign a mortgage without knowing what the terms are? Would you expect to get a driver's licence if you only skimmed the rules?" There are still copies of the new code on the table in the Gathering Space — take one, have a proper read.

PS: We will expect volunteers to sign the new code — but not for a year or so.

#### **Questions and Answers and Pentecost:**

I have been continuing my journey of spending time in Q&A's with children in the schools. It is illuminating and wonderful.

One question particularly struck me this week. What age was Jesus when he died? I said 33! Another voice said 30! Hmm. Actually both answers can be right because the Gospels are fuzzy on this and the calendar we use: Gregorian or Julian? Makes 3 years difference.

We could argue about the difference—but that would mean we ignored the real focus of the question: Jesus!! The Jesus who died and was Resurrected and at Pentecost sent the Holy Spirit to lead us: Halleluiah! We have the power to change the world: little by little: if we allow the Holy Spirit to guide us.

The presentation will be recorded for later viewing.

In late 2023 Pope Francis issued an Apostolic Letter calling for a `paradigm shift' in theology for world of today. His call was for theologians, priests, and parishioners 'to start from the different contexts and concrete situations in which peoples are inserted', allowing themselves 'to be seriously challenged by reality', and to discern the "signs of the times" in the light of the gospel?

Fr Orobator, SJ is the Dean of the Jesuit School of Theology, Santa Clara University, California. He is a Nigerian by birth and is former head of the Jesuit Conference of Africa and Madagascar. He has been deeply involved in the different stages of the current Synod on Synodality, including his participation in the First Assembly in October 2023 in Rome, at the invitation of the Pope.

This important meeting has been made possible by Newman College and is facilitated by the Sense of the Faithful group.

#### REFLECTIONS ON THE READINGS FOR THE FEAST OF PENTECOST SUNDAY

#### First Reading Second Reading

#### Acts of the Apostles 2: 1-11

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

They were all filled with the Holy Spirit, and began to speak different languages.

When God called Moses and the Israelites into covenant at Mt Sinai, awe-inspiring phenomena accompanied the event. Thunder, lightning, cloud, smoke, fire and a thunderous trumpet all testified to God's might and majesty. The descent of the Spirit on the apostles in Jerusalem is also marked by impressive signs – tongues of fire, a powerful and noisy wind, and a language epiphany.

The apostles were being "clothed with the power from on high" and "baptised with the Holy Spirit" just as Jesus had promised (Lk 24:49; Acts 1:5). Obedient to his command, they had stayed in the city and prayed in the upper room "together with several women, including Mary, the mother of Jesus, and with his brothers" (Acts 1:14).

They were not alone in Jerusalem. Jewish pilgrims from all parts of the diaspora had come to the city to celebrate the autumn harvest festival of Pentecost and commemorate the Sinai covenant and the giving of the Mosaic Law. This feast and much else in the Jewish tradition, such as creation, Babel and the oracles of the prophets, forms the backdrop to this new event.

#### 1 Corinthians 12:3-7, 12-13

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Corinthians In the one Spirit we were all baptised, making one body.

The tenor of the optional second reading for Year B text may deter its use. (The second reading and gospel for Year A may also be read in Years B and C.) Following the tumultuous energy of the Pentecost event, echoed in the psalm, the text from Galatians may come as something of a let-down. It presents a rather dark portrait of human nature, illumined only by a couple of shafts of light. Having championed the cause of freedom (5:1), Paul feels the need to issue a stern warning against its abuse. He enumerates at length the rotten fruits that self-indulgence engenders, all of which are destructive of community. Lists of moral evils like these were conventional in writings of the time. It's worth noting that few of Paul's list are so-called sins of the flesh.

Only towards the end of the passage does Paul offer a counter-list of the fruits of the Spirit, such as peace, goodness and patience. All are manifestations of the love that binds a community together. They are subject to no law or limit. But no sooner has Paul raised our spirits than he issues a further warning. You cannot belong to Christ, he writes, without crucifying all self-indulgent desires and passions.

If the first reading left us intoxicated with the Spirit, this one sobers us up with a large dose of cold water.

#### My neighbour took his life rather than face homelessness. Will Anyone bother to notice?

We lost one of our neighbours the other day. He climbed over the balcony railing and threw himself from the top floor of his apartment building onto the ground below. He'd been in that unit for 23 years and was a regular sight to all of us living in the little cluster of towers in Sydney's Kings Cross, as he sat on a chair on his open balcony, watching the world go by ... But last week, the world no longer passed by; it stopped right at his door. His nine-level building of 35 cheap rented studios, he learnt, is about to be torn down and redeveloped into a flashy new one of just 12 luxury three-bedroom apartments. He was set to be evicted, and homeless. This is the real face of the housing crisis: a middle-aged, lonely man, battling to survive on a low income, who felt he'd run out of options. This neighbourhood was his home, everyone he knew and everything he did was here ... What options can we in St Kevin's parish offer those in need? Do we notice those in need? We know an elderly lady and former Knitting Group member, now in Croydon, in urgent need of rental accommodation - John Costa. SJA
