Blessings, Tiziana

"I was born in Egypt into a big family that treasures family life. I have 4 brothers and 1 sister. We are all in the same business. All my brothers are married, and each has 2 children. They live together in the same large house working and supporting each other. We are blessed to have been raised this way. I was ordained a priest on the 4th September 2010. After 10 years in my ministry as an assistant priest, I became the parish priest and head of the Youth and Vocation Committee. In 2021, I asked my bishop for a break to pursue studies in Rome in youth psychology and counselling. I started to learn Italian and two months later I got a phone call from my bishop asking me to change my planes and travel to Melbourne to be Chaplin for the Coptic Catholic community. I believe that everything happens for a reason. It is providence. I was fearful of leaving my family, country, and culture to live overseas as a permanent resident.

I landed in Melbourne on the 10th of December 2023. I spent some time in St Patrick's Cathedral for orientation. On the 18th of January 2024, I was blessed to be appointed assistant to Father Charles. He does his best to make me valued, welcomed, loved and respected. I was praying that God helps me to make a good beginning, and as usual I receive more than I ever dream of or deserve.

Since I arrived in Doncaster, I have decided to make the most of what I have been given. I study Philosophy and Pastoral & Spiritual Care at the University of Divinity two days a week. I attend some courses at U3A.



He introduced St Paul to the twelve and worked with him in Antioch and on missionary work in the Mediterranean world. Championed the Gentiles at the Council of Jerusalem. Remembered as a good man, full of the Holy Spirit and of faith.

At first an Augustinian priest and scholar, then became a Franciscan to do missionary work in north Africa but this was thwarted by illness. Instead, he became a teacher of theology and a brilliant popular preacher in southern France and Italy. Remembered and loved as an inspired preacher, a servant of the poor, and a worker of miracles.



A letter to Clergy and Laity of the Archdiocese of Melbourne

Archbishop Peter A Comensoli recently returned from a pilgrimage of solidarity to the Holy Lands of Israel, the Palestinian Territories and Lebanon. In a letter to the clergy and laity of the Archdiocese, he says the pilgrimage 'allowed for significant opportunities in prayer, engagement and learning through that part of the world where, in the past, Christ walked and ministered, and where, today, the great Abrahamic religions and historical cultures live side-by-side, in very complex, and presently tragic ways'. In all this tragic complexity, he says, 'there are nonetheless signs of hope, actions of goodness and people of welcome and hospitality.'

Second Reading

REFLECTIONS ON THE READINGS FOR TENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

First Reading

Genesis 3: 9-15

A reading from the book of Genesis

I will make you enemies of each other: your offspring and her offspring.

The story of "the Fall" in the book of Genesis – the choice of the first man and woman to succumb to the serpent's tempting and eat from the tree of knowledge of good and evil in the middle of the garden – had an enormous impact on Christian theology and catechesis. Nonetheless it is never heard on a Sunday. The nearest we have to it is today's account of the consequences of their disobedience. There's shame, fear and blame-shifting for the human beings and a curse for the serpent, along with the hint of a future showdown.

The story is a masterpiece of simplicity and subtlety. After all this time it remains open to a variety of interpretations. The reference to conflict between the serpent and the woman has been understood to imply the ultimate triumph of good over evil. A long-standing Christian interpretation identifies the woman as Mary and her offspring as the Redeemer.

The reading falls into two parts. The first is the drama and dialogue involving the Lord God, the man and the woman. It has all the energy and tension of a courtroom scene. The second is the Lord's solemn curse on the serpent.

2 Corinthians 4: 13-5: 1

A reading from the second letter of St Paul to the Corinthians

We believe, and therefore we speak.

Readers and hearers alike may find this passage from Paul's second letter to the Corinthians perplexing. There are several reasons for this. In the first place it is an excerpt from a longer section in which Paul reflects on the trials of his mission. Without that background the reading begins rather obscurely.

The point of the short quote from Psalm 115/116 – "I believed, and therefore I spoke" – is not immediately clear.

Further on, Paul draws on Greek philosophical ideas that contrast the inner self with the outer self, the visible with the invisible, and the temporal with the eternal. He also assumes Jewish thinking about how present afflictions lead to ultimate glory. None of these streams of thought are worked into a neatly developed argument. We have more of a messy garden than a manicured lawn.

In spite of all this, Paul's message is clear enough. He's wanting the Corinthians to share in his conviction that trials and tribulations are temporary and can't compare with the glory that is sure to come. This conviction has been forged in the cauldron of his own struggles and setbacks. It's a hard-won lesson that he's keen for the Corinthians to be encouraged by.
