From the desk of the PP...

RCIA / Initiation of people into the Catholic Church

I am preparing to get the 2024/2025 journey underway, hopefully by September some time. Do you know anyone who might be interested in joining this journey into discovering Christ Jesus and the love and joy he brings into our lives? It's free. Please look around you and if you see or hear someone considering this option: please invite them to call me via the parish office. Or if you might like to join the team – that would be wonderful. Again, call me via the parish office.

Discernment with the Holy Spirit:

I have talked sometimes about discernment. That wonderful process where we seek to hear each other and allow the Holy Spirit space to enter into our choices, to inform us so that it is God's will, not ours that we follow. When I talk about it the process can seem simple and elegant.

I discovered recently how difficult it can be. I was asked to help two people resolve some matters. But as the conversation progressed I could find no space for resolution. The Holy Spirit did not guide me to resolution. Rather, it guided me to silence. Which perplexed me greatly! To be led to do nothing? To leave things as they were seemed insufficient. It was difficult. I wanted things repaired. But ... maybe the Holy Spirit is still working to help resolve something deeper. Seeming inaction by me in this situation perhaps opens a path for the Holy Spirit in some other way.

I encourage you to make space for discernment in your relationships and any consequential decisions. It's not magic. It often doesn't give you what you expect. It always gives what God wants.

In the last year, more crews have been abandoned by their employers than ever before. Many are still being denied the right to leave their ships for even a short break away from the relentless noise and pressure onboard. Many are reporting more stress and poorer mental health.

Petition on prayer in parliament exceeds its goal of 10,000 signatures

In recent weeks, Victorians were encouraged to sign a petition calling for the Lord's Prayer to be retained in the Legislative Council of the Victorian Parliament. Under the Legislative Council's Standing Orders, the petition needed 10,000 signatures by 17 June to be taken into consideration by the chamber. Exceeding this goal, the petition was presented to Parliament on 19 June with 10,912 signatures. A debate on the petition in the Legislative Council is now listed for Wednesday 31 July.



REFLECTIONS ON THE READINGS FOR THE SIXTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

First Reading Second Reading

Jeremiah 23: 1-6

A reading from the prophet Jeremiah

The remnant of the flock I will gather to me, and bring them back to their pastures.

In the early years of Israel's settlement in the Promised Land, leadership was exercised by spirited individuals called judges. When the people clamoured for a king, the prophet Samuel warned them about the consequences (1 Sam 8). Sure enough, many kings proved themselves false and faithless. Their failure to live up to the ideal of being trustworthy shepherds for the people ultimately led to the catastrophe of the exile in Babylon.

Jeremiah's oracle, spoken in God's name, begins with their condemnation but quickly becomes a word of great encouragement. God will bring home the exiles who have been scattered abroad, will make them prosper, and provide them with true shepherds. The metaphor then changes from shepherd to branch, meaning a shoot from the royal tree of David. This future monarch will be wise and honest and will rule with integrity. Which historical figure Jeremiah may be referring to is unclear, but his prophetic words came to have messianic meaning. Christians identify Jesus as this ideal king.

The reading thus falls into three parts – the diatribe against the false shepherd-kings, the assurance of return and rule by true shepherds, and the promise of a future king who would be divinely blessed.

Ephesians 2: 13-18

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Ephesians

Christ, our peace, has made us one.

Our readings from the letter to the Ephesians began last week with its long and rich opening prayer. That's followed by another beautiful prayer (1:15-23) assigned to the feast of the Ascension. Today we advance into the second chapter. Paul's theme is the unification of Gentiles and Jews, made possible by Christ's death on the cross. No longer are they separated by the observance or non-observance of the Law. They become one single Body in Christ. There's a subversive tone to Paul's repeated reference to peace. As a Roman citizen, Paul knew full well that peace was attributed to the person of the emperor, as the famous phrase "pax Romana" implied. Instead he credits Christ repeatedly with the gift of peace and unity, achieved ironically by his rejection and crucifixion.

This peace is for those "who were far away" and those "who were near at hand." Paul draws on the prophet Isaiah here (57:19). Isaiah was referring to Jews at home and in exile; Paul applies his words to Jews and Gentiles who are now united in a body in which ethnic and religious markers have rendered irrelevant.

Meet just two recently arrived Refugees from Gaza (with Voice extract from ABC TV, 17 July 2024)

Jeremiah's First Reading this weekend speaks complexly of the Promised land. That was long ago: At the Islamic College in Brisbane, new arrivals to the city are being welcomed at a school community around some traditional Palestinian food, and a chance to get to know one another through shared experiences. This is just one story. Shahrazad Hasera and Nidal her young son were in Surat when the bombing started. On the same day another one her son's friends died. "There was bombing on a field where they were playing. Nidal's friend was hit in the head by shrapnel. They were standing right next to each other. The ambulance came and took Nidal's friend. He was not dead, but was completely paralysed. I was so frightened and worried for my son Nidal, because he wasn't showing any emotions. He wasn't crying. He seemed emotionless and very hardened."...It's so easy for us far away to become detached from such disturbing daily realities for so many people in other places, but it's important not to. - *John Costa, SJA*
