Feast Days this week:...

11th November St Martin of Tours Bishop of Tours for twenty-five years. One of the first non-martyrs to be venerated as a saint. Widely remembered for his legendary generosity to the poor, for arguing against the persecution of heretics and especially for his active evangelisation and pastoral care of rural areas.

12th November St Josephat

Worked strenuously to uphold and spread the Union of Brest-Litovsk by which Churches of the province of Kiev, with their Byzantine liturgy and customs, had entered into communion with Rome. In a complex situation of national and religious antagonism, he was killed by violent opponents. Remembered for his energetic pastoral reform and courageous ecumenism.

St Kevin's Catholic Parish, Templestowe – An explanation of PARISH COLLECTIONS

How to contribute and where does the money go?

At each Parish weekend Mass, there are generally two (2) collections, namely:

FIRST COLLECTION – the first collection combines two (2) collections, the THANKSGIVING OFFERING collection, the funds from which go toward the upkeep of the Parish Church and to pay our Parish operating costs; and the PRESBYTERY OFFERING collection which supports the Parish Priest.

How to make your contribution:

AT MASS Contributions

Cash Contributions - For those parishioners who have signed up to the St Kevin's Parish Thanksgiving Offering Program (THANKSGIVING **OFFERING)** and who have chosen to make regular cash contributions, they can place their contributions in the **FIRST COLLECTION** using the Program's two-sided envelopes which carry a contributor number. The THANKSGIVING OFFERING contribution is placed in the GREEN side of the envelope and the **PRESBYTERY OFFERING** contribution is placed in the **RED** side of the envelope.

Note: Loose money (notes or coins) which is contributed via the **FIRST COLLECTION** is regarded as a contribution to the **PRESBYTERY OFFERING.**

Electronic or Direct Debit Contributions – Electronic Contributions to THANKSGIVING OFFERING can be made via the EFTPOS (Tap and Go) machine which is located on the table under the Parish Newsletter stand, near the Gathering Space entrance door.

Direct Debit – Parishioners wishing to made regular contributions to **THANKSGIVING OFFERING** via Direct Debit can make the necessary arrangement through the Parish Office.

SECOND COLLECTION (SOCIAL JUSTICE) – the moneys contributed via the **SECOND COLLECTION** form part of the St Kevin's Parish Social Justice Appeal program which may also include *one-off collections at Christmas and Easter*.



| REFLECTIONS ON THE READINGS OF THE THIRTY SECOND SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME | | |

| The widow made a little scone from her flour meal and brought it to Elijah. | <i>Christ offered himself only once to take the faults of many on himself.</i> | |
| The trusting faith of a poor widow is at the heart of both the first reading and the gospel. Neither, however, is named. In each case it's the male protagonist who dominates the story - Elijah in the first case and Jesus in the second. The prophet Elijah's mission in the northern kingdom of the 9th century BC was to uphold the worship of the God of Israel. The last six chapters of 1 Kings and the first of 2 Kings are devoted to Elijah's dramatic exploits in defence of the Lord. The Elijah cycle glorifies both the prophet and the Lord over against the Phoenician god Baal, whose cult had been introduced by King Ahab and his wife Jezebel. They became Elijah's mortal enemies. Today's story is set in the heartland of Baal worship. Elijah is in enemy territory. He is vulnerable and in need of God's protection, though the widow's plight is far more dire. She and her son are at the point of death. Though presumably not a believer in Elijah's God, she takes him at his word, shares her food, and is miraculously blessed. It's a colourful tale, with plenty of human appeal as well as impressive heavenly providence. Jesus cites it | Today's reading from Hebrews is unlikely to be readily understood by the faithful at large. To decode it fully one needs to have some grasp of both Platonic philosophy and ancient Jewish worship traditions. Platonic philosophy lies behind the contrast between the earthly sanctuary (the Holy of Holies in the Temple) and the heavenly sanctuary (the realm of God's presence). Along with this spatial dimension there's a temporal one. The high priests of old had to perform an annual blood ritual on the Day of Atonement (along with a range of other sacrifices) to atone for their own and others' sin. By contrast, Christ's single self-sacrifice has done away with sin once and for all; it is eternally present in the sight of God. The author writes of this self-sacrifice in the light of the fourth song of the suffering servant in Isaiah: "he was bearing the faults of many and praying all the while for sinners" (53:12). Jewish thought comes to the fore again in the expectation of Christ's return. History has a destination. Christ's second appearing will not be an occasion of judgement – sin has already been dealt with – but of the granting of salvation. | |

Further to last newsletter's depressing SJA 'war on children' commentary...

Beyond the unacceptable 66 conflict-related Australian dead children since 2020, a global perspective is important on conflicts, also affecting large numbers of innocent children. According to Caritas, Gaza is currently the deadliest place for civilians in the world. Since

escalation of the conflict began last October, over 42,000 people have died in the Gaza Strip and more than 99,000 others were injured. Over 60% of the casualties are civilians. Some 1.9 million people have been forced to leave their homes, almost the entire Gaza population; Next in order of severity, Caritas reports that fighting between the Sudanese army and the paramilitary Rapid Support Forces has caused an enormous humanitarian crisis. More than 18,000 people have lost their lives, over 33,000 others have been injured, and up to 12 million people have had to leave their homes. These include 4.6 million children, making Sudan the country with the highest number of displaced children in the world. In further descending order of conflict, Caritas reports next on deaths, suffering and displacements in Ukraine; Syria follows, where the war has entered its 14th year; 5th on the Caritas list is Democratic Republic of **Congo** where humanitarian needs are estimated at 25.4 million people, the highest of any country globally; UNICEF highlights Water scarcity affecting children particularly hard, revealing that one in three children in the world (739 million) live in areas exposed to high/very high/growing levels of water scarcity; Caritas then lists Yemen, Myanmar and Niger. These data also clearly highlight the importance of Charity. St Kevin's 2nd Collections last weekend generously contributed \$1,342.20 to Catholic World Mission Sunday, and earlier \$1,304 to NAPCAN (Child Abuse) - John Costa SJA
