Parish Pastoral Council:

The PPC met this week and had robust discussions about a number of topics.

One discussion was "What happened that St Charles Borromeo School Closed?" the only certain answer is that it had too few students to operate legally and effectively. Beyond that there are at least a dozen different factors that are involved from demographic shifts to changes in faith – they all play a role and newspaper articles suggesting one factor caused the problems are trying to reduce a complex situation to a simple solution.

Another was "what can we do that might draw people to Jesus." It is another complex area of thinking and need. Why don't people respond to the love that we see in Jesus Christ our Lord? Would we be able reach out to the broader non-baptised world by showcasing ourselves and our ministries at some special event or events? Or is that sort of event seeking primarily to help existing congregation members meet and talk to each other and so enliven existing faith?

That wasn't all we discussed, and we ran out of time before we reached the end of the agenda. We will be discussing things further and expect to come up with directions soon.

Dear St Kevin's community,

It has been a privilege to serve as your Lay Ecclesial Leader for these last three years. This is a wonderful parish, so it is difficult to let you know I have resigned from my role to pursue an academic career full time. This was not an easy decision to make.

In a parish, no one works alone. I am grateful for the trust placed in me by Fr Charles, and for the support of the hardworking, caring and talented parish staff (Nadia, Ana, Frances and David), the dedicated and enthusiastic groups of volunteers and all of you. I am heartened to see the fruits of our labour in bringing the parish out of the pandemic times to renewal and vibrancy.

I have led, supported and facilitated many initiatives. My role has been varied: to assist, to problem-solve and to be the conduit between different parts of the parish and to support the office staff. My role is practical - dealing with day-to-day management and pragmatic issues; pastoral (leading and coordinating certain ministries and liturgies) and strategic - looking ahead at parish renewal through ministries, providing leadership and ensuring financial sustainability. In my role, I have been acting Chair of the Parish Council, member of the finance committee, member of the liturgy committee, and member of Fr Charles' support group.

When I began my role in January 2022, we were just coming out of the pandemic and there was a lot of rebuilding to be done. I am delighted to have achieved so much in three years. REFLECTIONS ON THE READINGS OF THE FIRST SUNDAY OF LENT

First Reading

) outoronomy 26, 4, 10

Deuteronomy 26: 4-10

A reading from the book of Deuteronomy

The confession of faith of the elect.

The Passover is the key event of God's care in the history of Israel. This summary begins with the call of Abraham. God's people ended up in Egypt where they were enslaved. The Passover is a story of liberation when God frees them and leads them across the waters of the Red Sea to the promised land.

This story will be used at the Easter Vigil to articulate the mystery of Jesus' death and resurrection, and we regularly speak of the Eucharist as our Passover feast: it is our point of entry into the liberation from sin Christ has gained for us. As one of the Eucharistic Prayers says: With a mighty hand and outstretched arm you led your people Israel through the desert. Now, as your Church makes her pilgrim journey in the world, you always accompany her by the power of the Holy Spirit and lead her along the paths of time to the eternal joy of your Kingdom (EP/various needs II).

We celebrate God's saving work, recount his marvellous deeds and bow down in the sight of the Lord our God.

Romans 10:8-13

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Romans

The confession of faith of the believers in Christ.

Second Reading

Everyone who calls on the Lord will be saved! Three times in these few lines, Paul assures the Romans: you will be saved. Thus, the Lectionary again embraces the theme of liberation and deliverance which we have already encountered in the first reading and in the psalm. As one would expect from Paul, this is an offer not just restricted to Christians with a Jewish background, it is available to everyone without distinction. Paul is also insistent that this salvation comes from Christ. To access the liberation of Jesus' death and resurrection, we need to have a relationship with Christ. We call this relationship 'faith'. If your lips confess it and your heart believes in it, you will be saved. This message of reassurance is good news.

A Lenten thought - Love your neighbour as you Love yourself?

Extracted from a 3 March Opinion Piece in The Age, senior fellow at the Centre for Public Christianity **Tim Costello** says "In the flurry of executive orders issued by the 47th US president in his first 100 days, none is more devastating – or more deadly – than the **suspension of USAID**. The agency, founded by president John F. Kennedy in 1961, has been dismantled at the behest of Elon Musk, the world's richest man, now imposing misery on the most vulnerable. More than 2000 USAID staff have already been dismissed......USAID accounts for less than 0.5 per cent of the US budget, making its suspension ineffective in reducing the deficit but devastating for those who rely on it. I have just returned from Kenya and Uganda, where antiretroviral (ARV) drugs for HIV and tuberculosis treatments have vanished overnight......USAID administers George W. Bush's historic **President's Emergency Plan for AIDS Relief**, which has been the backbone of AIDS treatment across Africa. To date, that plan has saved more than 25 million African lives. It has been suspended without warning. In Kenya, thousands of health professionals may lose their jobs, and aid dollars already approved by Congress have been frozen. NGOs and local communities are shocked by the suddenness and the savagery".......Gutting USAID has also thrown Australian aid programs into chaos. The global aid sector works collaboratively to combat poverty and prevent duplication, with many of our agencies partnering with USAID programs. Not any more. - **John Costa SJA**
