Year C

Lent: A brief reflection



I had the privilege of hearing the confessions of a whole range of people who came to the Six30 Adoration session on last Thursday evening at St Patrick's Cathedral. It was a truly graced time. I have no idea who they were. I saw nothing of the Adoration (I heard a little singing through the sound insulation but no more).

But ...

I was struck again and again how much people love Jesus, and by how much his forgiveness means to them. Over and over. Every single person: loves Jesus. Yes, they were confessing sins but the sorrow in their voices showed their love of Jesus. It is amazing.

At a superficial level just about everyone who came to me came with similar sins. The same sorts of weaknesses that were present in the New Testament. The same sorts of weaknesses I hear in the parish. Variations – occasional surprises. But very similar.

Yet, despite the similarities, each person was unique. As I heard a little of the struggle for each person, I realised again and again that it was THEIR struggle. Jesus is walking with each of them personally. We are a community in Christ Jesus, and we must remain a community of the body of Christ of we cease to be Christian. But ... at the same time I am not just a part of a mob – I am myself and Jesus loves ME, and journeys with ME.

Our journey in faith through Lent this year may look similar to the journey of others, just as our sinfulness may look similar. But each of us has a path that is unique, a unique path for a unique person made in the Image of God, an accompanied by Christ, and guided by the Holy Spirit. Exciting isn't it! And doubly so because Easter is just around the corner.

Masses will be celebrated on this day at St Kevin's at 9.15am and at St Gregory the Great Church at 7.30pm.




BOOKISH MORNING TEA

covenant of the old law was: I will be your God and you will be my people. God looks after us and we live by God's law. In Christ, a new relationship with God is established for the human race by Jesus' death and resurrection. In this strange and mysterious story, Abraham offers in sacrifice a heifer, a goat and a ram with a couple of birds. God receives the offering after sunset with smoke and fire, and Abraham 'knows' in a fearsome dream that a covenant has been established. The new covenant established by Christ is not sealed with the blood of animals but by the blood of the cross. <i>This is my body which will be given up for you This is the chalice of my blood, the blood of the new and eternal covenant which will be poured out for you The glory of the resurrection is our promised land, our destiny and destination, if we are one with Christ.</i>	The shorter version of this reading is known by many as a funeral reading. Our homeland, our destiny, is heaven where we will be transfigured to share in the glory of the risen Christ. This section relates directly to the story of the Transfiguration which follows in the gospel. Paul makes it clear that this is something we are all meant to share by the gracious power of Christ the saviour. The first section of the reading which makes up the longer version is helpful in presenting the contrast – some think earthly things are the most important whereas, for us, our homeland is in heaven. However, the section is quite difficult to understand and may prove a distraction from the simpler and more direct presentation of our transformation in Christ.			

A Lenten thought - so little can mean so much

(Edited extracts from CathNews, 12 March 2025) "Caritas Australia's Project Compassion campaign this weekend highlights the significance that simple access to clean water has. Toefuata'iga is 13 years old and lives in Samoa, where access to clean water is a daily struggle. Despite Samoa being surrounded by water, her school experienced water shortages that threatened both the health and education of its students. Water shortages meant teachers have to leave the school to fetch water from nearby homes, or end classes early as children have no water to drink and no way to wash their hands. Many students also miss periods of schooling as they would repeatedly contract waterborne diseases. These shortages were due to a vulnerable pipeline system frequently shut down due to natural disasters and disrepair, leaving many communities relying on rainwater capture. Dry periods and unpredictable weather caused by climate change meant that Toefuata'iga's community, and her education, had reached a crisis point. Through the support of Caritas Australia and the generosity of supporters, Caritas Australia was able to partner with Caritas Samoa to support Toefuata'iga's school. A 10,000-litre water tank installed at the school stores enough clean water for the school's 300-plus students and teachers. This ensures the school can remain open, with students staying hydrated and well. "When we opened our water tank, the parents were really happy, they were over the moon. Now they don't need to send the children home early, and can keep up with

our lessons. "It's made such a difference," the school's principal, Ada, said. Access to water is more than just a convenience, it enables education, which is key to breaking the cycle of poverty." Our Parish and School previously funded a Water Tank for Loyo - a sister Elementary School in the Philippines. - John Costa SJA
