Words From the Desk of our PP...

St Charles Borromeo School: The last children finished at St Charles Borromeo School this past Friday and nearly all the staff have new roles. Many of the students and some of the staff have moved to St Kevin's school: we welcome them warmly into their new community and ask the Holy Spirit to fill their hearts with hope.

A week ago, I had a meeting with the school principal and senior managers from Melbourne Archdiocese Catholic Schools. They confirmed the timing for closure and that the site will be well protected with frequent patrols. We also discussed the future of the premises. It was confirmed that there is no sensible way to seek to reopen the school just as it has been (obvious I think, but worth stating). What also became evident is that there is real investigation being done around possibilities for the future of the site as a different sort of school. It will take time to properly develop options, but I am cautiously optimistic about the future.

Reconciliation: Congratulations! All of our grade three children who wish to do so have received the Sacrament of Reconciliation for the first time during this past week. And we now pray for them as they prepare for receiving Holy Communion for the first time in a few months.

One of the elements of what happens as we celebrate the sacrament, is that the parent (or parents) will introduce the child and tell me some beautiful things about their child. I ask for one thing that is good, but parents can never stop there – they see so much good in their child and are bursting with joy and pride for their child and want to share all that they see so usually I hear about six or seven things and have to call a halt. It is a beautiful moment, as is the Sacrament itself.

And it strikes me that this parental pride and joy is how God is only more so. We turn to Jesus recognising and weighed down with our sinfulness, whatever it is that we have done, and Jesus almost speaks over us to say "I love you and can see all the wonderfulness that is created in you." We are asked by God to seek to grow the good.

As we journey through Lent, I encourage you to grow the Good come and participate in this wonderful Sacrament, individually or via the Reconciliation Service on April 10th at 7:30 pm at St Gregory the Great.

The Annunciation of the Lord

This feast originated in the East during the sixth century and gained universal observance in the West during the eighth century. It is a feast of the Lord, commemorating the announcement to the Virgin Mary of the Word made flesh, Mary's acceptance of God's will and the conception of Christ nine months before Christmas. Its occurrence close to Easter links the incarnation with the whole mystery of human redemption in Christ.

Feast Days and Days of Solemnity


On **Tuesday, 25**th **March**, we celebrate the **Feast of the Annunciation.**

REFLECTIONS ON THE READINGS OF THE THIRD SUNDAY OF LENT

First Reading

Exodus 3:1-8. 13-15

A reading from the book of Exodus

This is what you must say to the children of Israel: I Am has sent me to you.

Moses was born under an oppressive regime in Egypt. Hidden in a basket in the reeds by a river, he was found and given protection by the Pharoah's daughter. As an adult, he was caught up in the persecution and he fled across the border to the north-east. He ends up as a shepherd and it is here that he has an extraordinary experience of the sacred.

He encounters God in the mysterious burning bush. He takes off his shoes and covers his face. The God who is revealed to him is, as the psalm will say, 'compassion and love, slow to anger and rich in mercy'. God has seen the sufferings of the chosen people and wants to deliver them from oppression and slavery.

Then comes the crunch for Moses. God is sending him back to Egypt to liberate the people and to bring them to the proverbial 'land of milk and honey'. (We will hear the story of how Moses leads them across the Red Sea at the Easter Vigil.)

The final paragraph will convey both Moses' determination and his nervousness in responding to God's commission.

Second Reading 1 Corinthians 10:1-6, 10-12

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Corinthians

All this that happened to the people of Moses in the desert was written for our benefit.

Following on from the story of Moses in the first reading, this text from Paul again makes use of the figure of Moses, but this time taking the period after the Exodus when the people spend forty years in the desert.

Paul reminds the Church at Corinth of God's gifts to their ancestors: they were led through the Red Sea, guided by a cloud, fed with manna and provided with water from the rock. He links these with baptism, Eucharist and Christ.

Paul wants to combat their competitiveness and their pride in their gifts by encouraging thankfulness to God. He refers to the destructive errors and complaints of the people of the exodus and uses it as a warning. We need to trust in God and rely on God's mercy.

There are some strong negative words in this text (corpses littering the desert, wicked lusts for forbidden things, killed by the Destroyer). However, the aim of the reading is positive to trust in God, to repent and to show gratitude.

A Lenten Reflection - Revisiting and Progressing Beyond the Past?

One of the curious and paradoxical things about life is that the more we learn the more we discover there is to learn. Partly that's because the volume of recorded history and other data, complete with variations and discrepancies, is increasing dramatically, and also subject to potential new inaccuracies, distortions or even mis-truths. There are also new developments, faster growing populations, and greater need to share resources and minimise inequalities. As complexity grows, humans compete more, and behaviour evolves accordingly. Partly it's also because of what we continually learn, including from from science (e.g the earth is not flat), space, psychology, and human behaviour in a more connected world. That's not a situation for despair, but rather an opportunity and need to collectively discern, based on new understandings, openness to change, together with faith and traditional values (which for some are the same). Australia recently suffered an unsuccessful and painful constitutional campaign for "The Voice", attempting to narrow the gap between first nations people and wider Australian society. **More recent** government data sadly highlights an *increasing gap* for key social-equality measures such as health, incarceration and education. In one small way at least, our Parish can be encouraged that our recent 2nd Collection campaign for Opening The Door Foundation has contributed towards "giving Koori kids an education of their Choice", by raising \$1,266.30 this year. In a small though real way, Parish 2nd Collections progressively contribute to a wide range of significant social needs. For this third weekend of Lent the 2nd Collection for Caritas Australia shares a very uplifting story of LAM, whose many struggles extend far beyond the physical disability he was born with and impressively overcame. Contributing money as a Parish is just one possible response to our faith mission to "do unto others as we would have them do unto us".
