My mother (and father) abhorred the commercial event that was presented as MOTHERS DAY—and that was sixty years ago!



Words from our PP on holidays...

Holiday Progress: As I write this I am in the Nottingham area, England, staying with family. Monday night and most of Tuesday was flying ... flying ... flying ... it is a long way and the first time I made the trip between England and Australia it took 8 weeks by boat so 1 day is a vast improvement. A night in a hotel then drive to family. Quiet, gentle, conversation, laughter, time, space ... a good start before the walk in Spain and other elements. Relaxing into ... being. Many years ago I came to visit thinking I'd be able to see all about Robin Hood ... Ah Well! They aren't interested, pure fantasy. Sightseeing doesn't form a large part of visiting family – family does.

Mystic Life: As part of this holiday, I am (finally) getting around to reading more of John of the Cross' writings about mystical doctrine. I am reading an abridgement of the writings, in a book I found on my shelves which originated from my father's library (rather old, 1934 but very well prepared).

I find his words encouraging because they give me hope that the slow progress I make along a path to deeper, contemplative, prayer is worthwhile. A progress from rote prayer to meditative prayer about 'things/matter' is normal but only the start.

If we persevere and seek to calm ourselves, to completely put aside ourselves and the world we can, slowly, and imperfectly perhaps, move towards contemplative prayer where we are completely alone and in the presence of God alone. John of the Cross says that we are all capable of this and it is an infinitely valuable journey even if you and I don't achieve the fullness of mystical life regularly. To have even moments of being with God is a treasure beyond price. Please, persevere in your prayer life, it is your journey into God's being.

REFLECTIONS ON THE READINGS OF THE FOURTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

First Reading

Acts of the Apostles 13:14, 43-52

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

We are now turning to the gentiles.

Much has happened between last Sunday's story of the apostles' trial and today's account of the mission of Paul and Barnabas. Stephen has been stoned to death; Saul has had his conversion experience; the mission to the Gentiles, revealed to Peter, has begun; the apostle James, son of Zebedee, has been martyred; Herod has died; and Paul has been sent on mission with Barnabas.

In Antioch (southern Turkey), Paul and Barnabas connect first with the local Jewish community. We do not hear his lengthy address in the synagogue, but we see the response he gets. The initial enthusiasm of his Jewish hearers changes to hostility when jealous leaders contradict him.

Paul decides to focus his mission on the Gentiles who are grateful and very happy with this development. This is one of the most important new directions we see in the whole of the Acts of the Apostles. The light of Christ will shine for all nations, even to the ends of the earth.

The text is quite long, but there is a strong narrative thread and vigorous action.

Second Reading Revelation 7:9, 14-17

A reading from the book of the Apocalypse

The Lamb who is at the throne will be their shepherd and will lead them to springs of living water.

An imaginative vision of the risen Christ enthroned in glory! One that brings comfort and consolation to persecuted Christians everywhere.

First, we have the immense crowd that is totally inclusive – people from every nation, race, tribe and language. There is an equal place for all with no discrimination. All are one in Christ.

These are the baptised, dressed in their white garments and holding palms of victory in their hands. Baptised into the death and resurrection of Christ, we all share his defeat of sin and death. This is vividly expressed in the first example of the 'clash of symbols': washed their robes white in the blood of the Lamb.

Then the promise of protection from hunger and thirst is expressed in the second wonderful example of the 'clash of symbols': the Lamb will be their Shepherd! Thus this text also opens up the theme of the good shepherd which returns in the gospel.

Catholic Social Justice highlighted following the death of Pope Francis (Part 2)

As introduced last weekend, a second theme now follows, based on the homily for Pope Francis' funeral by the Dean of the College of Cardinals, Cardinal Re. It provides a further yardstick for Catholic Social Justice from Christ's mission to us all. It also happens to relate to "Good Shephard Sunday" which our Archdiocese and Parish prayerfully observes this weekend. The following Social justice theme is also drawn from Lisa Zengarini, Vatican News, 26 April 2025.

2. Referencing the Gospel passage where Christ charges Peter with shepherding His flock, Cardinal Re remarked that "Despite his frailty and suffering towards the end, Pope Francis chose to follow this path of self-giving until the last day of his earthly life" in which he "followed the footsteps of his Lord, the Good Shepherd". All of us too are called, in various ways, to follow Christ's footsteps "walking as pilgrims of hope on the path of the Gospel".

Part of the hope for social justice offered by St Kevin's Parishioners comes from our 2nd Collections. Over the Easter Period this resulted in \$518 Catholic Care pastoral support raised for needy Families, Children and Individuals, locally and over the Holy Land, and separately over that period \$1,308.65 for missionary and welfare support at Holy Places. For those able to assist in other ways various forms of social Justice can be offered practically, via our Social Justice Action Group. Enquire SJA or the Parish Office - John Costa SJA
