## Words from our PP on holidays:

Fr Charles on The Way

As I write this I am about to begin my third day along the Camino of Santiago de Compostella. I was already at the start of my brief Camino when I looked up Compostella: field of stars. How beautiful! I am still waiting for a fine night when I can get out and maybe see what the night sky looks like here. It must have been stunning to warrant adding it to the name of the city.

The first two days have been ... a struggle physically – my legs ended the days feeling like logs. But ... alongside that – beautiful rolling scenery and green scenery, with lots of country smells and working farms and farm dogs and .. a wonderful sense of just being 'in the moment'. Not all the time, I find it very difficult to 'not think' and sometimes I find myself counting steps but ... maybe that is part of the journey.

I am on a tour with a guide (praise the Lord, Vince is the most amiable man with a sense of humour to be treasured). Nine of us plus him. He shepherds us beautifully. Walking with the slowest to be sure they aren't lost – allowing the fastest their leads. And we keep tabs via a whatsapp group. There is a group of four who get everywhere 30 minutes ahead of me having stopped for coffee and things along the way. Then me and another; and about half hour behind the remainder of the group. Walking at our own pace.

This third day (and indeed the fourth day tomorrow) will bring a shorter total distance but the steepest climbs and descents but ... hopefully my legs will manage.

I keep you in my prayers as I rise and offer Mass and as I walk along. Thank you for keeping me in your prayers.



## 'Habemus Papam': Australian Catholics welcome Pope Leo XIV

The bells of St Peter's Basilica rang out across Rome on the evening of 8 May, signalling to the world that the Catholic Church has a new shepherd. At 6.07pm Rome time (2.07am AEST), white smoke billowed from the Sistine Chapel chimney, drawing thousands more into St Peter's Square, where crowds had already gathered for the smoke watch. Leo XIV appeared moments later, dressed in white, and offered his first apostolic greeting: 'Peace be with all of you.' In his Urbi et Orbi address, the new pope echoed the peace of the Risen Christ. He paid tribute to his predecessor, Pope Francis, whose voice, he said, still resonates with the faithful. 'We still retain in our ears that weak but always courageous voice of Pope Francis blessing Rome!' he said. 'Let me follow up on that same blessing: God loves us, God loves you all, and evil will not prevail!' Taking the name Leo XIV, the new pontiff situates himself in a lineage of reformers and bridge-builders. As the first pope from the Augustinian Order, he affirmed, 'I am a son of St Augustine, an Augustinian, who said, "For you I am a bishop, with you, I am a Christian." In this sense we can all walk together toward that homeland that God has prepared.'

His remarks were warmly received by Catholics around the world, including here in Australia.

This Sunday, 18 May, Pope Leo XIV will officially inaugurate his papacy with Mass in St Peter's Square. The Mass will be livestreamed on the Vatican News YouTube channel at 6pm Melbourne time.

# REFLECTIONS ON THE READINGS OF THE FIFTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

## First Reading

## Acts of the Apostles 14:21-27

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

They assembled the church and gave an account of all that God had done with them.

This is the second half of the so-called first missionary journey of Paul. As described here in the reading, this return trip that Paul and Barnabas make is something like 1,000 kilometres, half on land in present day Turkey, and the remainder by sea across to Syria. Given the demands of travel at the time, one can understand Paul speaking of the hardships they all have to endure for the sake of God's kingdom. Before they leave they appoint elders, local leaders. Even at this early date (c. 46-49 AD) structures are being put in place for the governance of Church communities.

Paul and Barnabas obviously think the endeavour has been worthwhile – they assemble the Church on their return and give witness to God's work in bringing the Gentiles to faith.

## Second Reading

#### Revelation 21:1-5

A reading from the book of the Apocalypse

He will wipe away all the tears from their eyes.

In keeping with the festive spirit of the Easter season, the Lectionary selects passages from the Apocalypse that gleam with glory. This is one of them. In this dream, everything is made new. The world is transformed. The holy city of Jerusalem (at that time, recently destroyed) is made new and depicted as a bride for the risen Christ. It represents a transcendent and future reality when God will dwell among his people, making his home with us. This glorious vision for the end of time is referenced in the final lines of the two Eucharistic Prayers for Reconciliation: our Eucharist holds out this promise: Freed at last from the wound of corruption and made fully into a new creation, we shall sing to you with gladness the thanksgiving of Christ who lives for all eternity. Bring us to share with [Mary and the saints and those who have died] the unending banquet of unity in a new heaven and a new earth, where the fullness of your peace will shine forth in Christ Jesus our Lord. ## **Catholic Social Justice highlighted following the death of Pope Francis (Part 3)**

Further to this SJA series on continuation of Pope Francis' legacy of Catholic Social Justice action (& 'synodality'), the following extract from Commonweal Magazine "The World's Pope" May 12 2025, echos that:

Part 3. ".....Signs of continuity with Francis's papacy soon emerged, to the delight of some and the dismay of others—including no small number of Prevost's native countrymen. Leo pointedly used the words "synodality" and "dialogue." He forcefully restated the Christian obligation to care for the vulnerable. In his May 10 address to the College of Cardinals, he called for renewal of "our complete commitment to the path that the universal Church has now followed for decades in the wake of the Second Vatican Council." He then quoted Francis's Evangelii gaudium, highlighting that document's emphasis on, among other things, "the return to the primacy of Christ in proclamation"; collegiality and synodality; attention to the sensus fidei [sense of the faithful], including popular piety; care for the least and the rejected; and "dialogue with the contemporary world in its various components and realities."

On a related topic, Chaplains play a very significant role in Hospitals, Prisons, and the Wider Community. I was once privileged to volunteer visiting people in Youth Training Centres and Prisons. It's notable that Sr Mary O'Shannassy SGS has just retired after the longest ever period of 30 years unwavering service as senior chaplain of what was the Catholic Care prison ministry team in Victoria. As reported in Melbourne Catholic, Archbishop Peter Comensoli has presented Sr Mary with the Papal Cross of Honour—the highest honour the Pope can confer on an individual for distinguished service to the Catholic Church.
