From the desk of the PP...

ACYF: Australian Catholic Youth Festival. 30th Nov – 2nd Dec. acyf.org.au

<u>Alpha</u>: Our latest experience started last Wednesday with 21 participants. Please keep the leaders and caterers in your prayers as we seek to open hearts to God's love.

Safeguarding: David, Mary, Mary, Peter and I sat down last Wednesday to do a Risk Assessment for our Masses at St Greg's, especially weekend Masses. We will use the same process at St Kevin's and the issues will be almost identical because the gatherings are nearly identical in purpose. By the time we finished the hour and a half brainstorming we had listed over forty different elements to consider. The list covered much more than the ChildSafe elements. Some items were of great importance like how to respond effectively to a significant fall or implementing good processes around our Altar Servers as they vest. Some were seemingly trivial such as proper use of the air-conditioners. Our purpose in starting this detailed risk-assessment is to understand what we think we know and improve the safety of our gatherings for all of you, as well as be ready for the Safeguarding audit that is beginning across the archdiocese. Occupational Health and Safety efforts over the decades have shown the worth of moving from assuming we know what we are doing to consciously.

<u>Columbarium (a wall with niches for funeral urns to be interred):</u> Plans for a columbarium are well underway and have been submitted to council for approval. We are looking for more expressions of interest so that we can be reasonably certain that we are meeting your real need in the parish. Please call or email the office and express you interest. Once we have final plans in place, we will be contacting you to ask you to commit firmly and pay for the slots you want.

I see the columbarium as providing a new expression of our faith, allowing us to accompany our faithful departed in a sensible and respectful way that keeps them within our parish community in a gentle and loving way.

<u>Insurance:</u> We are seeing a shift in our insurances. There is a greater level of detail being demanded of us in specifying what we want insured and the exact value of it that we see. The aim is to allow access to the most relevant and cheapest insurance. I mention this because it seems to me to be a part of a shift in society. Risk is not borne by me to help you: rather I leave you to bear your own risks. It seems to me to run counter to what Christ teaches us about love for one another with God's self-giving, care for the other that nourishes our souls. Food for thought as we navigate a more and more nuanced complexity in society.

<u>Mass Amalgamation</u>: A huge *Thank You* to all of you who completed a Mass Survey sheet indicating your preferred time for the amalgamation of the two Sunday morning Masses. Referring to the results, it has been decided to change our Sunday morning Mass time to **9.15am**. When will this new time begin? More news next week.



REFLECTIONS ON THE READINGS OF THE NINETEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

First Reading

Second Reading

Wisdom 18:6-9

A reading from the book of Wisdom

Just as you struck our enemies, you made

us glorious by calling us to you.

The second half of the Book of Wisdom, from which this piece is taken, is a meditation on scripture largely embellishing the stories of the Exodus. This makes sense of these rather obscure lines.

"That night" is the night of the Exodus when they celebrated the meal with the Passover lamb, marking the lintel with its blood to escape from the final plague ("offered sacrifice in secret"). They ate standing up to be ready to leave and cross the Red Sea. This foundational event established the pact or covenant with God. "The ruin of their enemies" and "vengeance on our foes" refer to the Egyptian army drowned in the Red Sea. "Saving the virtuous" and "made us glorious" refer to the liberation of the people from slavery. The people respond with hymns of praise.

Hebrews 11:1-2, 8-19

A reading from the letter to the Hebrews

We will look for the city designed and built by God.

There is a longer and a shorter version of this reading from the letter to the Hebrews. But those who read the whole of Chapter 11 will be somewhat disappointed by even the longer version. The whole chapter is a magnificent litany of characters in the Old Testament who lived by faith, starting with Abel. The repeated phrase 'by faith' gives this chapter extraordinary rhetorical force. Our longer version just takes the central section dealing with Abraham and Sarah. It would be a pity to shorten even this. Faith accepts the blessing of the heavenly world and responds in trust and hope to the reality of what is unseen. God takes the initiative to care for us and provide for us. The human response is faith.

Faith opens the way for the wonderful works of God. Faith is both an engagement with what is not yet present but is confidently awaited, and also a recognition of a present reality which is not known except by faith. Those who live 'by faith' are searching for something beyond the material world. Then we have the inspiring idea that we are searching for our real homeland which is in heaven, a home established for us by our loving God.

The first sentence sets out the foundation for the litany which follows. It is good to see Sarah included among the examples of faith.

80th Anniversary of world's first wartime use of nuclear Bomb at Hiroshima, 6 August 1945

(Incorporating some edited extracts from major news sources)

Thousands of people including a record number of delegates from international countries and regions gathered at Peace Park in Hiroshima on August 6 to commemorate the 80th anniversary of the world's first wartime use of a nuclear bomb – as survivors, officials and representatives from 120 countries and territories marked the milestone with renewed calls for disarmament. The city was flattened on that day when the United States dropped a uranium bomb, codenamed "Little Boy". Roughly 78,000 people were killed instantly. Tens of thousands more died by the end of the year due to burns and radiation exposure, and others still suffer the Hiroshima's mayor, Kazumi Matsui, warned of the dangers of rising global militarism, criticising world leaders consequences today. who argue that nuclear weapons are necessary for national security. During an historic visit to Hiroshima and Nagasaki in 2019, Pope Francis met survivors of the bombings and condemned the use and possession of nuclear weapons as "immoral", and urged support for "the principal international legal instruments of nuclear disarmament and non-proliferation, including the Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons" (TPNW). He also said that a world without nuclear weapons is "possible and necessary". A strong critic of the doctrine of nuclear deterrence he said that "nuclear doctrines" foment "a climate of fear, mistrust, and hostility", adding that the possession of nuclear weapons is never the answer to our longings for security, peace, and stability. Nuclear weapons only ever afford a "false sense of security", he said, as peace cannot be achieved through "the threat of total annihilation". I have visited Peace Park in Hiroshima twice, and been profoundly moved by horrific evidence including photos of a flattened desolate city, small clothing fragments on models of children who were on their way to school at 8:15am, packed lunches fused into stone, clock and watch hands and glass fused, charred bodies and badly burned short-term survivors some distance away. Impressively, the park is now a symbol of hope. The Treaty entered into force on January 22 2021 and was awarded the Nobel Peace prize. It currently has 93 signatories (and 70 state parties). New Zealand is among them, Australia, disappointingly, is not (yet?)- John Costa SJA
