October Rosary: October is approaching, a month dedicated to our lady. This year we would like to do a Zoom Rosary. One night a week, pray the rosary together – virtually. I am in the process of preparing details but put aside 30 minutes at 7 pm on each Thursday evening of October: The 2<sup>nd</sup>, 9<sup>th</sup>, 16<sup>th</sup>, 23<sup>rd</sup>, 30<sup>th</sup>.

**New Catholics:** The next group of people preparing to join the Roman Catholic faith will begin its journey on 4<sup>th</sup> October: Saturdays, 3pm to 5pm. I have two people for sure, and possibly four, to join me and the RCIA team as we enter into the wealth of faith and belief.

The survey will be open for two weeks, beginning the weekend of September 13<sup>th</sup> –14<sup>th</sup>, 2025.



**March for the Babies** is an annual event held in Melbourne, advocating for the right to life of unborn children. Come and show your support for the unborn. Let's share some details about this meaningful march:

Date and Location: The 2025 March for the Babies will take place on Saturday, October 11th. Participants will gather at Treasury Gardens (corner of Spring Street and Wellington Parade) at 12.30pm and then embark on a peaceful walk to Melbourne Parliament House. It's a powerful demonstration of solidarity and a call to protect the lives of the most vulnerable among us.

**Purpose**: The march aims to:

- o Remember: It serves as a day of remembrance for unborn children.
- Advocate: Participants peacefully affirm the right to life for every unborn child.
- Support Women: The event also seeks to assist women facing crisis pregnancies.
- Respect Conscience: It advocates for freedom of conscience for healthcare workers who oppose abortion<sup>2</sup>.

This is the 17<sup>th</sup> annual March for the Babies, and every year since 2009, thousands of Victorians have gathered peacefully with grief and hope to remember the ever-increasing number of babies killed by abortion in this state since the Government legalized abortion-till-birth on October 10, 2008

#### REFLECTIONS ON THE READINGS OF TWENTY FIFTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

First Reading Second Reading

### Amos 8:4-7

A reading from the prophet Amos

The Lord God spoke against those who buy the poor for money.

Some 750 years before Christ, Amos emerges from his rural life to challenge a prosperous nation. One of his prominent themes is promoting social justice. His language is strong: *trample, suppress, swindling, tampering...* He is defending the needy, the poor, from exploitation and cheating by those who hold the economic power.

He challenges not only the dishonesty of the merchants but also their priorities. They do not care for the festivals or the sabbath – their only concern is to make money from their trade. They manipulate the needs of the poor for their own ends.

The reading begins with a startling command: *Listen to this!* 

## 1 Timothy 2:1-8

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to Timothy Let prayers be offered to God for everyone; he wants all people to be saved.

This text suggests that the Christian community is finding its place within the society and the Roman empire. The aim is to 'be able to live religious and reverent lives in peace and quiet'. There is to be no anger or argument.

Secondly the reading promotes a universal inclusiveness within the Christian community, for God wants everyone to be saved. Christ is the one mediator between God and the whole human race; he offered his life as a ransom for all. So prayers in the community should be offered for everyone, even the pagan rulers of the empire and others in authority. Embedded in the middle is a brief profession of faith: There is only one God and only one mediator, Jesus Christ.

### Mission? & Synodality?

Our Parish has an active history of 'Mission', more recently with others also exploring and further anticipating 'Synodality'. In part, Pope Leo recently described Synodality (Crux, 15 Sept. 2025) as "an attitude, an openness, a willingness to understand. Speaking of the Church now, this means each and every member of the church has a voice and a role to play through prayer, reflection... through a process". But how might we associate Mission and Synodality? At weekly Masses we now collectively "stand open to new ways of being Church" - further engaging with the disturbing world and challenging times in which we live, now better informed with knowledge and understandings. In a sense that association has already begun, and particularly from 2026, will progress further with our richer collective Parish understanding and wider adoption of Synodality, and associated opportunity to more fully embrace it in our Mission.

Too often it's easier ignoring a distressing world than actively facing its many challenges, yet there's rich opportunity to make a difference through shared goodness. An existing example associating Mission and Synodality is illustrated in the article "Integrating our shadows to heal the world" (The Far East, Sept/Oct 2025) by Oceania Regional Director Rev Dr Patrick McInerney, who says "Living in this violent world, let us strive to reduce the hostility and animosity. Let us rise above the narrow sectarian interests that divide people and instead promote our common humanity. Let us transcend the tribal partisanship that separates us from other and find a perspective that unites. Let us listen deeply and attend to conflicting needs and concerns - even when they are confronting. Let us see the whole picture, where each person plays a necessary part......" - John Costa SJA
