From the desk of the PP...

<u>Safeguarding Audit:</u> Up to date? I hope so! 90% of volunteers are – YIPPEE!! Which means some still need to finalise some part of Working with Children Check, Police Check, Code of Conduct, role description. Call the office if you are uncertain.

Things we do: Continuing my thoughts on what we do during Mass. Arising from the Liturgy Workshop that we had a week ago with Fr Frank O'Loughlin: Bread and Wine.

Bread! Why bread? Because in Jesus' day bread was a staple food – an essential part of staying alive, something consumed all the time. Bread (or some equivalent like Rice in Asia) is essential for survival. To consume bread is to acknowledge that at a radical, basic level we are not in control, we need something to keep us alive. In the Eucharist we remember the Bread of the Passover/Exodus; the Bread from God, the Manna in the desert; the bread of freedom when the people entered the promised land. And now, in the Eucharist Jesus takes the bread and it becomes the bread of eternal life.

Wine! Wine is different from bread: it is not a staple but to celebration. Wine cheers the human heart; changes us, loosens us, raises our spirit. Wine was drunk three times during the Passover meal for the Israelites: Jesus added a fourth cup. The cup of wine we consume in the Eucharist a cup that changes us from beings bounded by earthly things into beings who are opened out to the fullness of God's Spirit through his Son.

The depth and breadth of the symbolism in the bread and wine is amazing! We plan to bring some workshops over the coming year that will help all of us understand the depth and breadth of the Eucharist a little more. God bless, Fr Charles

## REFLECTIONS ON THE READINGS OF THE FEAST OF THE EXALTATION OF THE HOLY CROSS

First Reading Second Reading

## Numbers 21:4-9

A reading from the book of Numbers

When those that were afflicted looked upon it, they were healed.

The Exodus from slavery in Egypt is the defining event in the Old Testament. But after crossing the Red Sea, the people wandered in the desert for forty years. They complained frequently to Moses.

The people, and God it seems, lost patience with one another. But when they were struck down by fiery serpents, they went to Moses to express their sorrow. Moses interceded on their behalf. He made a bronze serpent and lifted it up, so that anyone who looked upon it was saved from death by snake bite.

This event is quoted in today's gospel. As for Israelites who looked upon the bronze serpent, so too, all who look upon Christ lifted up on the cross will be saved and receive eternal life.

# Philippians 2:6-11

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Philippians

He humbled himself, therefore God had exalted him.

We last heard this reading on Palm Sunday. It is likely an early Christian hymn which expresses the whole of the Paschal Mystery of Jesus' death and resurrection. It summarises beautifully and concisely the meaning of today's feast.

Prominent here is the 'lifting up' which we see in the other readings and which is actually embedded in the name of the feast itself. Note that this is God's work: God raised him on high to receive the adoration of 'every creature under heaven'.

Hearing these words should bring the assembly to worship.

#### **2nd Collections**

Parish and Archdiocese Collections are necessary for the existence and operation of our Church and its many works. '2nd Collections' are more discretionary, and help us focus on those around us with urgent needs where we can help. Our parishioners are warmly acknowledged in writing by recipient organisations for 2nd Collection generosity. More recently this includes \$363.90 for Nungalinya college, a combined Churches Training College to Equip Indigenous women and men for leadership roles in Churches and Communities. Their representatives will be visiting our Parish in mid October to thank and update us on recent activities, and any parishioner interested in directly hearing about their work is welcome to join this daytime gathering by letting SJA or the Parish office know. Other recent collections include \$430.68 for Catholic Care, \$430.68 for Stella Maris (providing chaplaincy to seafarers). A further donation of \$361.85 assisted Opening The Doors Foundation (providing Koori kids with an education of their choice). Earlier this year our Project Compassion appeal for Caritas Australia raised \$4,061. We also earlier collected \$1,097.50 for Vinnies.

Further afield we contributed \$567.25 to the Pope's annual 'Peter's Pence' global appeal, collaborating with local Catholic Missions supporting initiatives in Zambia. This appeal is dramatically helping families facing heartbreaking choices of either feeding their children or selling crops to survive. It importantly helps also with education, upgrading medical equipment to ensure women and newborns receive the care and dignity they deserve, and supports evangelisation. This *global* collection in 2024 raised 54.3 million Euros (~AUD \$96.8 million). SJA will shortly start collaboratively planning our Parish 2026 2nd Collection schedule - John Costa SJA
