Safeguarding Audit: The audit is upon us – this coming Wednesday morning. We are as ready as possible but still please keep us in your prayers.

Congratulations to Fr Anton: during the evening of the 29th of September, Fr Anton attended a citizenship ceremony and was officially admitted as an Australian Citizen. An important moment for him, so please congratulate him.

Things we do: Why does the General Instruction to the Roman Missal (the GIRM) encourage us to receive both the Body and the Blood of Christ at Holy Communion?

At St Kevin's the practice has been in place since about 2005. At St Greg's it's never been the practice as far as I have heard, except perhaps in a very limited way. Different ways, different places?

It got me pondering, as you know happens.

The principal reason for receiving both Body and Blood is because ... that is what Jesus SAID to do: take and eat, this is my Body ... take and eat, this is my Blood. In receiving both Body and Blood we are giving a clearly visible sign of doing what Jesus did. It's not about receiving 'the whole of Jesus' – as though we can divide Jesus into little pieces. No, it is about what we see and experience in the physical act of DOING as Jesus did and requested us to do.

There is never compulsion to receive either the Body of the Blood – communion is a choice, to be consciously chosen and received with reverence (which I see in effectively everyone who comes to received).

I pondered for some time before reintroducing Communion receiving both Body and Blood as St Kevins' – I am pondering seeking to introduce the practice at St Greg's.

What are your thoughts – on the way we enact this practice at St Kevin's? on whether it's a good idea at St Greg's. (Putting aside the logistics of distribution.)





Date and Location: The **2025 March for the Babies** will take place on **Saturday, October 11th**. Participants will gather at Treasury Gardens (corner of Spring Street and Wellington Parade) at 12.30pm and then embark on a peaceful walk to Melbourne Parliament House. It's a powerful demonstration of solidarity and a call to protect the lives of the most vulnerable among us.

Purpose: The march aims to:

- **Remember**: It serves as a day of remembrance for unborn children.
- **Advocate**: Participants peacefully affirm the right to life for every unborn child.
- **Support Women**: The event also seeks to assist women facing crisis pregnancies.
- **Respect Conscience**: It advocates for freedom of conscience for healthcare workers who oppose abortion².

This is the 17th annual March for the Babies, and every year since 2009, thousands of Victorians have gathered peacefully with grief and hope to remember the ever-increasing number of babies killed by abortion in this state since the Government legalized abortion-tillbirth on October 10, 2008

REFLECTIONS ON THE READINGS OF TWENTY SEVENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

First Reading

Habakkuk 1:2-3; 2:2-4

A reading from the prophet Habakkuk

The just will live by faithfulness.

Part One: The prophet Habakkuk looks around and sees oppression and injustice, tyranny and violence, contention and discord. In a series of fierce rhetorical questions, he complains that God is not fixing things up. He protests that God is not listening and will not save him.

We look at the world today and can also cry out to God in frustration and despair.

Part Two: God replies with a calm and peaceful but also enigmatic oracle. It isn't clear what 'the vision' refers to. Yet the promise will be fulfilled – it may take time, but come it will, without fail. The passage ends with an exhortation to faithfulness, to trust in God's providence however bleak things may seem. It is here that the prophet opens up the gospel prayer: Lord, increase our faith.

2 Timothy 1:6-8, 13-14

A reading from the second letter of St Paul to Timothy Never be ashamed of witnessing the Lord.

Second Reading

Today the Lectionary moves us to the second letter to Timothy, the first of four selections. Attributed to Paul, it presents itself as a farewell message reflecting on Paul's ministry and giving final instructions to his colleague and successor.

Paul has handed on leadership by the laying on of hands for the gift of the Holy Spirit. Centuries later as rites of ordination were developed, this liturgical gesture would remain central.

Great prominence is given to the Holy Spirit in the service of leadership. The Spirit will bring power for suffering and witness, love for drawing the Christian community together, and guidance to preserve the precious teaching which enables the Christian community to encounter Christ.

Gaza, The West Bank and Israel

"The world is witnessing harrowing events in Gaza, the West Bank and Israel - events that raise urgent questions of justice, human rights and accountability." Extracts from an Australasian Catholic Coalition for Church Reform Flyer for their recent cosponsored Garratt Publishing webinar (moderated by ACCCR's Eleanor Flynn) presented by Australian human rights lawyer Chris Sidoti, with open discussion and excellent summary response by Sr Susan Connelly. This complex story and devastating history is separately the subject of a very recent joint Gaza proposal by Donald Trump and Benjamin Netanyahu.

"Chris is is a member and centre of of the UN Human Rights Council's 'International Independent Commission of Inquiry on the Occupied Palestinian Territories, including East Jerusalem and Israel', which investigates alleged crimes committed during the conflict, with genocide among its critical areas of focus. Susan a Sister of St Joseph, was a primary school teacher and principal before working for 10 years teaching scripture in state schools. Since 1994 she has worked on projects in Timor-Leste (East Timor) initiated by the Mary MacKillop Institute of East Timorese Studies".
