From the desk of the PP...

ACYF!!! Australian Catholic Youth Festival: 6000 pilgrims plus organisers: please keep them all in your prayers. Our preparations are nearly complete.

Thanksgiving: The United States of America celebrates Thanksgiving on Thursday of this coming week. I have a friend who lives in Louisiana. We were chatting last Monday, and the subject of Thanksgiving came up: she wanted to know if we celebrate that day. I had to say 'no.' At least not in the same sense that they do. Thanksgiving remembers that moment when the pilgrims had survived their first year in a new country and could harvest the food of their growing after living through a winter.

We don't have any equivalent founding story in Australia, though an AI comment caught my eye when I checked the date: Thanksgiving is celebrated in Norfolk Island – interesting, presumably growing out of their roots of settlement.

As my friend and I chatted I got to thinking. Certainly, we don't have a holiday that is remotely similar unless it is Christmas because that tends to be when families make a special effort to gather, and for those who follow the Lunar Calendar, the Lunar New Year is a time of special family gathering. Neither has the same overtones as the USA celebration but the family gathering is 'similar'.

Then it struck me that as Catholics, as followers of Jesus Christ, this weekend with the Feast of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe is something like an equivalent of Thanksgiving.

The whole of Salvation history culminates in this moment: after Adam and Eve and the Fall, God started a whole process: the revelation that we see in the Old Testament; the coming of Jesus Christ with his passion, death and resurrection, ascension and coming of the Holy Spirit: this all culminates in Jesus as Lord, and the truth of what Jesus says to the thief on the cross "I promise you", he replied, "today you will be with me in paradise."

I won't be going much for the USA Thanksgiving, it is not my Holy Day. But every day I am giving thanks again and again, that Jesus is Christ, King of the Universe, king in my life.

Feast Days this week:...

24th November

Ss Andrew Dùng-Lac & Companions Andrew (1795-1839), baptised at the age of 15, worked first as a lay missionary and then as a diocesan presbyter before being beheaded at Hanoi (Vietnam).

Listed among 117 canonised martyrs who died in Vietnam between 1820 and 1862: 96 Vietnamese, 11 Spanish Dominicans and 10 presbyters from the Paris Foreign Mission Society.
Remembered as representatives of the thousands of Christians tortured and martyred in Vietnam between the seventeenth and nineteenth centuries:

bishops, presbyters, religious and lay

people, both children and adults.

REFLECTIONS ON THE READINGS OF THE FEAST OF CHRIST THE KING

First Reading

Second Reading

2 Samuel 5:1-3

A reading from the second book of Samuel *They anointed David king of Israel.*

About a thousand years before Christ, David was anointed king. In this reading, the people of the northern tribes seek him out to be their king also. Notwithstanding some notorious failures, he was a good ruler and well-loved. So much so that, when calamity overtook the people, the prophets continued to speak of deliverance through the House of David. It was to be a Son of David who would come as the Messiah, the Christ (these titles mean 'the anointed one') to restore and rule over the nation. Jesus, the Christ, the Son of David, comes as a descendent of the shepherd-king to become the good shepherd who leads people to the kingdom of God.

Colossians 1:12-20

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Colossians *He has taken us into the kingdom of his beloved Son.*

I am the Light of the World, says Jesus (Jn 8:12). The preamble to this reading thanks God for bringing us out of darkness and into Christ's kingdom of light where we will find freedom and forgiveness.

Then Colossians quotes an early liturgical hymn about Christ that is cosmic in scope. It falls into two parts. The first extols Christ as the image of God and the head of the whole of creation; the second part acclaims Christ as the redeemer in whom all things are reconciled.

At the hinge of the two parts is the beautiful image of the Church as the Body of Christ with Christ as the head. This draws all the baptised into the unity of creation and the reconciling, peace-making work of the cross.

This poetic text evokes contemplation of the sacred work of Christ.

Mixed approaches to Youth Crime; Under 16s Social Media Ban - Will it work? 2nd Collection Feedback

Perhaps with Elections somewhat in mind there has at least been greater local focus recently on youth, and youth crime. SJA reported in our 25/26 April Parish Newsletter on a successful large scale Scottish program where offending and at-risk youth were diverted into a successful special active-program other than detention. On Wednesday the Victorian Government announced a new but far narrower program employing focused Social Workers in selected schools to specialise in such issues, and elsewhere divert particular offenders into limited programs along Scottish lines. In contrast the choice has also been made to treat worst youth offenders in adult terms. At the same time a limited 'Social Media Ban' for under 16s, contested by global providers, is to be introduced, with its success to be monitored. But as for some other bans, can this ban work effectively? Meanwhile a new mental health study reported in The Age (19/11/2025) reaffirms that teenage boys and young men are lacking positive male role models, but that new programs are also on the horizon.

Our Parish has continued to receive appreciative letters. The Brigidine Asylum seekers welcomed our second collection of \$703.15. Their latest Newsletter provides a moving personal snapshot of individuals they continue to support in rebuilding lives. Brother Harry Prout of the Heidelberg West Exodus Community expressed gratitude for our \$931.80 saying "we would like to put the money towards a Fund we have created to assist two Palestinian families we are supporting - for one year now - with utility bills. These two families - mothers and sisters - have work rights now but are still attending language classes to help them secure employment." - *John Costa, Chairperson SJA*
